Herdsmen Course Offered— Oregon dairymen and breeders wanting men trained in herdsmanship are offered a short course in this line at Oregon Agricultural college January 3 to June 3, next. Students will spend most of their time at the barn engaged in work with the college herds, under supervision of a specialist. Much actual work with the stock is required, because the college proceeds on the plan that no man can become a good herdman without training and experience. More than 125 head of purebred dairy cattle, excellent representatives of each breed that made fine records in the show ring last fall, will supply the material for study of management, breeding, milk yield, and pedigree-making. Full particulars will be sent on application to the college dairy department, Corvallis.
