Charles Ganiere

Charles Ganiere was born in France, October 30, 1836, and came to this country as a young boy locating at first in New York state with his grandparents and brother. Some years later he went to Chicago and at the outbreak of the civil war enlisted as a volunteer in Co. I, 88 Illinois infantry. At the battle of Chicamauga, his division was commanded by General Phil Sheridan.

Mr. and Mrs. Ganiere were married fifty-years on the 20th of October. They have lived in Ashland for the past thirty-four years. During the summer Mr. Ganiere has been in failing health and for over two months has been confined to his bed. Besides his widow and one sister living in Fort Dodge Kansas, seven children live to mourn his loss. They are Mrs. May Hembree, Mrs. Emma Warren, Mrs. Gertrude Snow, and George H. Ganiere,

who all live in Portland; Mrs. Harriet Stafford, of Long Beach, Calif., Mrs. Alice Alpers, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Louise Perozzi of Ashland. Mr. Ganiere passed away Saturday morning, December 10, at 10 o'clock at his home at 148 Wimer street. He was aged eighty-five years, one month and eleven days. He was a prominent member of Burnside post No. 23, G. A. R., of this city. The funeral was held this afternoon from Stocks undertaking parlors, Rev. C. A. Edwards of the Methodist Episcopal church, officiating. Interment in Hargadine cemetery.

Nitrate of soda and nitrate of lime have been used in Jackson county on orchards for several years, and the best results have been obtained when the nitrate has been applied in the late fall or early winter. Ordinarily nitrate gives good results when applied in the spring, but on account of the small amount of rain-

FREIGHT RATES UP 49 PER CENT LIVING UP 100

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 12.—In July, 1921, the latest month for complete data available, the average railway freight rate in the United States was 49 per cent higher than in the period from 1890 to 1899, and the average wholesale price of commodities was exactly 100 per cent higher. This announcement based upon elaborate statistics showing the entire history of average railroad rates and average prices from 1890 to 1921, and taken from interstate commerce commission and bureau of labor records, was made by the "Railway Age" today. Referring to the fact that the most serious complaints regarding the present rates comes from the farmers, the Railway Age shows that the average wholesale prices of farm products are now 88 per cent higher than from 1890 to 1899.

"The average railway rate steadily declined," says the Railway Age, "until 1917, and was then 15 per cent less than in the period from 1890 to 1899. It was not until 1918 that a general advance in rates applying to all the railways was made and in that year average wholesale prices had increased until they were 165 per cent higher than the average from 1890 to 1899."

"The real reason why there is at present so much complaint about alleged high railway rates is that for a long period of years shippers and producers become accustomed to doing business on railway rates which were steadily declining and prices which were rapidly increasing. When they complained now about the relations between rates and prices they usually compare them with the relation which existed in 1916 and 1915. But all reasoning of this time, it is most unfair and fallacious because for a long period before these years rates had been declining and prices have been increasing to such an extent that rates had become unreasonably low compared with prices. At the present prices of commodities and the present railway rates the producer or owner of almost any commodity can buy far more railway freight transportation with any given amount of that commodity than he could have bought with it in any year prior to 1910, and much more than he could have bought at the average rate and prices from 1890 to 1899."

fall in this section and the fact that the tree roots gather their food from various depths and the heavy clay soils that are prevalent in Jackson county, it is best to apply nitrates to orchards during December and January. I have been informed that the Farm Bureau exchange has a car of nitrate on the track now and it can be obtained from the car at a less price than after it has been unloaded and stored. Orchardists interested can save money by getting their supply from the car. C. C. CATE, County Agent.
