Tell the receiving clerk what your parcel contains, advises Postmaster E. J. Kaiser. There are three items necessary for the clerk to know: First, the classification he should apply; second, whether he should apply on the parcel the "fragile" mark; third, whether he should apply the "perishable" mark. The question of applying these marks is determined by the clerk on the contents, and not by the container.

John Rigg was appointed to represent the American Legion in cooperation with the Red Cross and the Ministerial association, in caring for indigent ex-service men who pass through Ashland, and ask assistance.

The Memorial monument erected last year by the citizens of Ashland remains partially unpaid for, so Ashland Post has appointed a committee consisting of Don M. Spencer, chairman, V. V. Mills, Dr. Gordon MacCracken, and S. A. Peters Jr.,

to look after this matter and determine why this remains unpaid for and how payment will be effected. While this is believed to be a public debt, the Legion is greatly interested, so much so in fact, that it raised \$75 by subscription among its members in about three minutes.
