Woods camp and many other points, while telephone wires enable the watcher to send a fire alarm to any of the surrounding stations.

"Ashland has pre-empted Lake o' Woods and Mount Pitt, having, or soon will have—a good road to the lake and from there to Pelican bay, on Klamath lake, connecting with a road to Crater Lake. The road from Klamath Falls to Lake o' Woods leads through a rough country, which Klamathons would naturally not be anxious for visitors to see.

"Klamath Falls, the fourth place in the Southern Oregon circuit of scenic attractions, could take tourists through their rich irrigated and reclaimed lands to the Lava Beds, south of Tule lake. Here might be reproduced some of the thrilling incidents of the Modoc Indian war.

The nearby wonderful ice caves could be visited, in connection with a trip to the Lava Beds, supplemented, of course with camp fires and barbecues, as at the other places. "At each of the four places, side trips could be arranged to other points of lesser interest, with lectures, literature and other features which would make the event of the greatest possible advertising value, as well as social and esthetic interest, to the community and visitors. Permanent equipment and accommodations could be accumulated from year to year, and co-operation practiced in advertising the enterprise as one of the big tourist attractions of the West."
