VINING WILL ATTEND STATE ELK MEETING

Prof. Irving Vining expects to go to Portland Monday to attend the State Chamber of Commerce meeting to be held there Tuesday, having been selected delegate to represent Ashland at this convention. Prof. Vining also expects to remain in Portland to attend a special state meeting of the Elks' lodge, Friday, January 6. One of the purposes of this meeting is to further the membership invitation campaign, which the Elks are conducting. Prof. Vining is chairman of the committee of Ashland Elks which has this work in charge. It is hoped to increase the membership of the local chapter to an even thousand. The present number lacks less than 100 of that figure. The national goal is 1,000,000 members. The B. P. O. E. lodge is already the largest lodge in the United States.

Prof. Vining is enthusiastic, saying this lodge has greatly improved in character as well as numbers since its organization. Welfare work, which includes relief, community service, and the "Big Brother" movement, has become a very prominent part of Elk activity. In Ashland \$300 was spent last week for Christmas baskets, which were given to needy families, by the lodge men. About four times as many baskets were needed this year as last year. Such work is done strictly without any publicity. The community committee aims to assist in every way possible all movements for the benefit of the community. The "big brother" movement pledges the lodge to see that every boy in the community, who is found to be suffering for lack of proper clothing, food or medical attention, is supplied with these necessities.
