DISHES FROM GOLDEN FRUIT.

A glass of orange juice once or twice a day is a healthful drink for very young or the aged. Oranges contain sugar, mineral matters and flavors that are especially good for the blood. A tablespoonful of orange juice given to the baby will correct constipation. It is a medicine that no one will refuse to take, and that is the whole problem with children.

Orange and Nut Pie.—Cream two tablespoonfuls of butter with one cupful of sugar and one-half cupful of boiled rice pressed through a sieve while hot. When well blended add one cupful of boiling water and cook slowly until thickened, stirring constantly. Mix the grated rind and juice of one large orange, one tablespoonful of lemon juice and two egg yolks. Add this to the hot mixture and cook for two to three minutes. Remove from the fire and cool slightly. Pour into a baked pastry shell; sprinkle with one-half cupful of finely-chopped nut meats and one cupful of orange pulp. Cover with a meringue, using the two egg whites and when stiffly beaten, stir in four tablespoonfuls of sugar. Heap on top roughly and bake until a delicate brown.

In all orange puddings avoid cooking at a high temperature any orange, as it becomes bitter and unpalatable. The juice separated from the pulp is palatable cooked.

Orange Whip.—Soak two tablespoonfuls of gelatin in one-half cupful of water for five minutes; add one cupful of boiling water and one-half cupful of sugar and stir until the sugar and gelatin are dissolved. Add one and three-fourths cupfuls of orange juice, one-quarter of a cupful of lemon juice; strain and cook until it begins to thicken. Beat until foamy; fold in the stiffly-beaten whites of two eggs and heap lightly in orange shells placed in sherbet glasses. Garnish with a section of orange with all the membrane removed.

Johnny Cake Marches to Rescue

A first aid to empty stomachs he has ever been. But as a life-saver Johnny Cake appears in a role strange even to those who have known him long and loved him well south of the Mason and Dixon line. For Johnny's now a relief worker.

This startling news recently reached Near East Relief headquarters in New York from its agents in Transcaucasia. It was disguised in the terse announcement that the first shipment of American corn ever sent to the Near East has arrived in Armenia, where it was received with joy by a starving populace.

Most of the shipment was made in the form of corn meal, to save space and freight charges. Among the relief personnel in the City of Alexandropol, where twenty thousand children are housed in American orphanages and where thousands more are reported starving on the streets, was a daughter of the "Old Dominion." It was she, with memories of a chubby childhood, who introduced Johnny to her young charges.

As a result of that one shipment of corn meal the relief director for the entire Transcaucasian district, informed relief officials at New York Headquarters that several hundred ragged, hunger-shrunken tots, none over five, were admitted to orphanages in Alexandropol and Erivan, where lack of sufficient supplies had hitherto kept them out.
