Hungarian throne. The movement collapsed and Charles is now an exile upon the island of Madeira.

A revolution broke out in Portugal which overturned the government. Conditions are still unsettled in Portugal and the suggestion has been made that France, Spain and Italy intervene.

A small war began in the Balkans when the Albanians took up arms against the Serbians. Albania claimed that Jugo-Slavia was encroaching upon her territory.

Although the Moscow soviet maintained its power intact, there were a number of disturbances in Russia. A revolt began at Kronstadt, the great fortress defending Petrograd on the sea side, but was put down by Leon Trotzky after several days of desperate fighting. The latest uprising in Russia broke out in the Ukraine. It was led by anti-Bolshevists, and there was violent fighting

Uprisings in India
Grave unrest broke out in India, where the Moplah tribesmen went upon the warpath against the British. Many have been killed in fighting. Despite the turbulence in India, the Prince of Wales carried out his plans to visit that country.

Several times during the course of the year, discord developed between Great Britain and France, and it looked for a time as though the entente between the two countries would entirely break down. Some of the causes of the dissensions were German indemnity, the upper Silesian settlement, France's desire to invade the Ruhr district of Germany, the Graeco-Turkish war in the Near East, and France's treaty with the Turkish nationalists.

Jap Premier Assassinated

On the eve of the Washington conference, Premier Hara, of Japan, was assassinated at Tokio. It was feared that the murder might affect Japan's policy at Washington, but apparently it did not. Shortly afterward Crown Prince Hirohito was made regent of Japan, because of the continued illness of the emperor. One of the biggest calamities of

the year was the Russian famine. America took the leadership in giving relief, but despite this assistance vast numbers of victims have succumbed, chiefly children.
