On with the Dance

"On with the dance, let the skirts be unconfined," is Fashion's dictum while she claps her hands for the music to strike up. This means that skirts must billow and ruffle their way over the dance floor, but so slightly and so nonchalantly that one is scarcely aware of the added circumference. There are various tricks of the trade whereby this fullness may be achieved. To begin with the fabric can, of its own volition, stand out in the desired bouffancy. That's why you see so many of the frocks, patterned after the modes of the beauty-loving Ex-Express Eugenie, are expressed to-day, as in that ceremonious past, in taffeta. And you can even obtain the same shimmering taffeta shading from gold to blue, from yellow to rose with all the mellowness of the peachblow, in blendings that take on new loveliness at every movement. JACKSON HEAD OF WILSON AWARD FOR THIS STATE

Oregon is to have a leading part in the movement to honor former President Woodrow Wilson and to perpetuate his ideals through the Woodrow Wilson Foundation. C. S. Jackson, of Portland, publisher of the Oregon Journal, as state chairman is perfecting plans for the opening, on January 16, of a campaign through which will be raised this state's share of an endowment fund of at least \$1,000,000. The income of

This fund will be used by the Foundation to make periodic awards to the "individual or group that has rendered, within a specified time, meritorious service to democracy, public welfare, liberal thought or peace through justice." Associated with the chairman in this work are many of the state's most prominent men and women. The idea of establishing a Foundation to perpetuate the ideals of the former President originated among a group of women who met at the home of Mrs. Charles L. Tiffany, of New York, Christmas, 1920, and was expanded through conferences with the friends of Mr. Wilson. Under the direct of Franklin D. Roosevelt, chairman of the National Committee of the Foundation and Assistant Secretary of the Navy under President Wilson, Cleveland H. Dodge, chairman of the Executive Committee and classmate of Mr. Wilson at Princeton; and Hamilton Holt, executive director; organization of the Foundation throughout the United States has been practically completed. January 16 has been designated as the date when subscriptions to the fund will be taken. In the meantime substantial subscriptions are being received at national headquarters, 150 Nassau Street, New York. When the fund has been raised it will be invested in securities of the United States Government or in other approved trust fund securities and will be under the management of a Board of Trustees to the number of fifteen nationally representative men and women, who will disburse the income annually to the Jury of Awards. The awards will be comparable in significance to the Nobel Prizes. Headquarters for Oregon have been opened in the Oregon Journal Building, Portland.

WASTE NOW MADE INTO PAPER

Announcement from Washington by the Research Bureau of the Interstate Cotton Seed Crushers' Association, the National organization of the oil mill products trade, that the commodity known as cotton linters, a former waste by-product of the cotton seed oil mills, has at last been adopted by paper manufacturers as a successful substitute for cotton rags in the making of high grade bond, ledger and book paper, marks the culmination of many years of persistent scientific experimentation. Linters suitable for paper making are produced by second and third cuttings of the fibre left on the seed after ginning, the first cut having supplied the requirements of the bedding and mattress trades. It is necessary to remove more or less of this lint to enable the mills to extract a maximum amount of oil. During the war, Government efforts to conserve the production of linters to provide the necessary cellulose basis for smokeless powder and other high explosives in the munitions program. Special machinery and processes had to be devised to properly clean and bleach cotton linters to meet paper-making requirements. A group of large oil milling companies cooperated in the expense of a conversion plant at Hopewell, Va., under the name of the Stamco-Cotton Company. J. W. Stull, President of the Company, whose persistent efforts have created the new industry, states that it marks a new era in paper making, and that England and Europe are also strong potential markets for Stamco linter pulp. From 50 to 100 per cent of linter pulp is now used in good writing and book papers according to grade desired or proficiency acquired by the operators. In order to satisfy a public demand for paper containing linter pulp that has already developed from a patriotic desire to promote a new domestic industry, manufacturers are adopting distinctive watermarks or otherwise guaranteeing linter content. Louis N. Geldert, in charge of the oil mill trade organization in Washington, D. C., states that while the present special demand for linter pulp is largely due to sentiment, there are economic reasons why it can be depended upon to be permanent. "Linter pulp is welcomed by the paper trade," he says, "because of its superior qualities and its promise of dependability in quantity, and it will not be long before that trade will absorb every pound that can be produced by the nearly 800 oil mills in the Southern States. Other new uses for cotton linters are also being commercially developed very fast." Mr. Geldert says, "notably in the making of imitation leather or celluloid articles, and of artificial or synthetic silk, but the paper trade provides a market for the entire production." Oil field fires are estimated to cause a loss of 1,500,000 barrels of oil in the United States annually.
