#### Arthur Burch, Accused Killer, Attempts Death

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 6 .-Arthur Burch, on trial for the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, attempted suicide today, according to a report made today by the guards. The guards claim that Burch tried to throw himself from a bridge forty feet above the ground while returning to the jail from the courtroom late yesterday afternoon.

## SUBMARINES ARE OUTLAWED: ROOT PROPOSAL O.K.'D

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6 .-The last of Senator Root's resolutions, virtually outlawing the submarine as a weapon of warfare against commercial vessels, was adopted today by the five powers. It makes a commander of a submarine which attacks merchant ships in contradiction to the rules of warfare, a "pirate" and liable to punishment by death.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6 .-Poison gas as a weapon of warfare is going on trial before a jury of five powers here, and it may meet spite the unanimous report made today in favor of its retention by a subcommittee of expert representatives of all the powers concerned at the armament conference.

#### \$50,000,000 Needed To Make Enforcement Of **Prohibition Successful**

CONGRESS IT MUST COME TO RESCUE IF LAW IS UPHELD; ENFORCEMENT BUDGET WAITS APPROVAL.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6. -Fifty million dollars-count 'em -is needed to make a success of prohibition enforcement.

This pat declaration was made today by Prohibition Commissioner Haynes, who sees dangers ahead for the Volstead act. He will tell congress, he says, that it must come to the rescue, if the law is to be upheld and respect for it secured-by compulsion if necessary.

Commissioner Haynes' estimate UI LIV IIIUIIVAI of the sum neded for running expenses of the treasury's prohibition unit now is before Budget Director Dawes for approval. It covers needs of liquor law enforcement for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923.

"I absolutely need \$2,500,000 more from congress next year than was allowed in the current fiscal year," said Haynes. "That means an appropriation of \$10,-000,000. But that is not enough. I ought to have \$50,000,000 to tackle this job right."

Greatly enlarged forces of dry law agents in all states to co-operate more actively with the state and municipal authorities is imperative, in Haynes' opinion, to insure literal compliance with the with the Volstead law.

Commissioner Haynes said the government is now going the limit in an assault upon illegal trafficking in rum. A smash is now on to stop the leaks at distilleries.

COMMISSIONER HAYNES TO TELL Stopping liquor at its source, officials said, is a prime need. What they aim to do is to scan permit applications so closely that diversion of whiskey withdrawn from warehouses to illegal uses will be made virtually impossible.

But Haynes is fully cognizant of the fact that even after all his efforts have been exhausted, with the comparatively limited group of dry law agents at his command, there still will remain other and perhaps equally bafling phases of the Volstead law problem up to him for action.
