YOUNGSTOWN REFORM ON

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Jan. 10.—One week ago Mayor Oles gave the underworld just seven days to "love up, drink up, pack up and leave town or reform."

Police Chief James Watkins had this message today from Oles:

"Please see that the following orders are enforced:

"Notify all clubs that gambling and drinking will not be tolerated.

"Pool selling on horses must be stopped, immoral houses abated, arrest all street-walkers and men with no visible means of support. Notify bootleggers they must cease the traffic in liquor.

"All gambling houses must be closed."

COMPLETE MOTOR LINERS

LONDON, Jan. 10.—Two motor passenger liners just finished are stated to be the first of such vessels equipped with oil engines to put to sea. It is reported in the current issue of the Motor Ship that during November in England six oil-engined vessels were completed and seven launched, and thirty-eight motor ships during the quarter.

U. of O. Course for Commercial Secretaries

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, January 10.—(Special)—A short course for the commercial club secretaries of the state will be offered by the University during Easter vacation week from March 27 to April 1, according to an announcement by the school of business administration.

Besides classes in public speaking, commerce, journalism, sociology and physical education, there will be a number of round table discussions on topics of particular interest and value to the secretaries.

About fifteen secretaries of various active commercial clubs and chambers of commerce in the state, were enrolled last year and it is expected a much larger number will take advantage of the course this March.

SALEM AFTER GAMBLERS

SALEM, Or., Jan. 10.—Punchboards in Salem poolrooms, card rooms and other public places were banned by Verden Moffitt, chief of police, in an order issued here last night.

Chief Moffitt said he had received numerous complaints recently about punchboards and other gambling devices. The police have been instructed to seize punchboards found on their beats and arrest the operators on charges of gambling.

COPPER CARBONATE DUST MAY PROVE SMUT CONTROL

New Remedy Promising Both in Checking Disease and Immunity from Seedling Injury.

That copper carbonate dust treatment for stinking smut of wheat apparently successful is announced by H. E. Bars, plant pathologist of the O. A. C. Experiment station.

Although definite results cannot be obtained until next harvest, the winter stand of grain in fields thus treated in 17 Oregon counties shows less injury than stands where seed was treated by either the formaldehyde or the bluestone-lime method.

"It is entirely possible that this method may in time supersede the cumbersome liquid treatment," said Professor Bars, "also seems to promote prompt and more vigorous germination. Two ounces of copper carbonate in dust form are thoroughly mixed with each bushel of seed in a revolving drum.

"The ultimate solution of the smut problem does not lie in improved treating methods, but in the growing of varieties of wheat which are highly resistant or immune to the disease. Great progress has been made in Oregon under the direction of H. M. Woolman, field assistant in cereal investigations. In trials with nearly 1000 varieties and strains of wheat, he has discovered 12 or more varieties which are highly resistant to smut, and which may in time be developed into varieties suitable for the different sections of the state.

CHILDREN MUST HAVE VITAMINES IN FOOD

(By International News Service) COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 10.—That many children do not receive the right kind of food is the claim made by Prof. J. F. Lyman, Ohio State University.

"Malnutrition is common in all parts of America and among all classes," declared Prof. Lyman. "A nutrition survey in a state not far from Ohio recently revealed 57 per cent of the children getting enough to eat, but only 11 per cent of them getting food properly balanced to their nutritive requirements.

"The main deficiency was in vitamin-bearing foods, such as vegetables, fruit and milk. Failure to provide such food for growing children leads to conditions which differ only in degree from those in the Balkan countries.

"There, as here, the principal lack is in vitamins. There they do not have such foods. Here we do not seem to know how properly to use what we have."

VIOLATION OF BILLS OF RIGHTS CLAIMED

SALEM, Jan. 10.—The argument that restoration of capital punishment in Oregon was a plain violation of the bill of rights and that the legislature exceeded its authority when it proposed the resolution restoring the death penalty in this state was advanced by attorneys for Elvie Kirby, alias James Owens, in briefs filed in the supreme court here today.

AUTO CAMP FEE FIXED

SPOKANE, Jan. 10.—Automobile tourists who make use of tourist camps will be charged 50 cents a night under rules adopted by representatives of 30 camps of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, meeting here yesterday as the first Pacific-Rocky mountain tourist camp conference.

Tourists will not be limited in their stays. Standard rules were adopted relating to lights, silence after 11 p. m. and registrations. Camps, in the opinion of delegates, shall include fuel, toilets, water, lights on grounds, policing, registration and sanitation.

PLAN POLISH CANAL

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The Polish press states that a syndicate composed of Polish capitalists is seeking a concession for the construction of a canal from Silesia to Danzig.

Correspondence Study

During the month of December 96 students registered in 113 courses in the correspondence study department of the Extension Division of the University of Oregon. This brings the total registrations in correspondence study courses to 1086, representing every county in the state.

Failure to Make Grades

Thirty students have been dropped from the University of Oregon for failure to make passing grades in enough subjects during the fall term. Eighty-one students have been placed on probation for the present term for work that was unsatisfactory. Nineteen hundred students successfully passed the examinations.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Senator Borah, leading the progressive republican opposition to Senator Newberry's right to retain his seat, charged that Newberry's election was "tainted by the corrupt use of money and refused to accept Newberry's explanation that he was not personally responsible for the large expenditures in the republican primaries at which he gained the nomination for the senate from the state of Michigan.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—By a dynamite explosion in a tunnel of the new Hetch Hetchy project three men were killed and three probably fatally hurt. Part of a charge failed to explode and was set off when the gang started to drill new holes.
