The latest attack comes from Mrs. Kendall, who, in a speech at Three Arts club, told her audience that the modern descendants of Eve are too fond of money and have too much desire to get at the height of their ambitions at 25, whereas it used to be 40 or thereabouts. They also are anxious to get the best of clothes at an early age, she added—and not too much of them.

An enterprising London newspaper published a symposium of the views of leading actresses on Mrs. Kendall's accusations. The stage women were unanimous in scoffing at her reproaches.
