DAMAGE SUIT OVER A BOTTLE OF LIQUOR

SCRANTON, Pa., Jan. 14 .- An unusual suit for damages as a result of the enactment of the prohibition law was filed in federal court here by Mrs. Irene Dauberman, of Lewisburg, Pa. Hepolit Szutowicz, of Mil ton, Pa., is the defendant.

Mrs. Dauberman charges that last August her husband, Clarence Dauberman, purchased a quart of whiskey from the wife of the defendant and then lost control of his reason and shot Sheriff Rennor of Lewisburg, in the wrist, and John P. Tegmeier in the chest. Dauberman was later convicted and sentenced to six years in the penitentiary on charges of assault with intent to kill.

Mrs. Dauberman asks for \$30,000 damages from Szutowicz because of the humiliation and discgrace caused her, and for being deprived of the society and financial support of her


