HARDING PROMISES SUPPORT TO CANAL,

CHICAGO TO THE SEA WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 18.—Negotiations of a treaty between the United States and Great Britain looking toward improvement of the St. Lawrence river between Montreal and Lake Ontario, so as to provide a deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic ocean may be expected to be undertaken soon, it was said today at the White House. The arrangement of such a treaty is recommended in the report of the international joint commission transmitted yesterday by the president to congress. Conclusion of such a convention would be the first step toward making possible the long discussed lakes-to-ocean waterway. President Harding, it was also said at the White House, is much interested in the project and intends to lend his influence toward early diplomatic efforts.

COLD WAVE HITS PORTLAND; ZERO WEATHER IN EAST ORE.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 18.—This vicinity is experiencing the coldest weather it has had for two years. The minimum record reached here was at 7 o'clock this morning, when the mercury touched 16 above, a drop of five degrees in two hours. Cities east of the Cascades are even colder. Spokane reported a minimum of eight below; Boise, Idaho, four below; Walla Walla, two below; Baker, Or., two below. Seattle had a low mark of 18 above. The weather man predicts this cold snap will last a few days.

MOONSHINER KILLED IN QUARREL

ROSEBURG, Or., Jan. 18.—The remote cabin home of Wallace Freyer was the scene of a tragedy Sunday night, when Freyer's nephew, Douglas Tapp, aged 34 years, alleged moonshiner and fugitive from justice, was killed in a drunken brawl with C. M. Young, a neighboring farmer. Young, who surrendered immediately following the killing, is in the county jail at Roseburg. Sheriff Starmer and Coroner Ritter left Monday for the scene of the shooting, which is several miles from Kellogg.

According to Young's story, which he told freely, he shot Tapp in self defense after the alleged moonshiner crazed with drink, tried to kill him, actually firing once preceding the fight.

According to Young's statement, which was made under oath at the direction of District Attorney Neuner, he went with his brother-in-law, Roy Hughes, to the home of Wallace Freyer late Saturday night, intending to hunt over Sunday. Tapp fled from Yoncalla recently upon learning that the federal authorities were seeking for him, after wrecking a still, which is said to have been conducted there, and had been in hiding near his uncle's home. Young says that he came to Freyer's cabin at about 11 o'clock Saturday night and remained with them all night.

Sunday morning Hughes and Young went hunting together and Tapp took the dogs and went in another direction. Unable to hunt because of the fog, Young and his brother-in-law returned and Tapp came in about noon carrying a deer. In the afternoon they went out again, and Tapp killed another deer, coming in with it about dusk.

After the evening meal Tapp, it is asserted, pulled out a gallon jug of moonshine from a hidden cache in the cabin and invited the members of the party to drink. Young states that he and Hughes did not like the liquor and had only two drinks which they diluted with hot water and sugar. Freyer and Tapp drank heavily, however, Young says, and Freyer especially became very drunk and sick. Tapp, according to Young's story, became boastful of his law violations and his ability at making moonshine, claiming the liquor in front of him as being some of his own make. As the evening wore on Young says Tapp became more and more quarrelsome and boastful and at about 10:30 declared:

"I've been living in the woods for the last month; I'm a fugitive from justice, and I'd as soon kill anybody—I'd even kill you."

"With these words, he leaped to his feet and shoved his rifle against my stomach," Young said, as he told his story.

"I grabbed the barrel and shoved it to one side just as he fired and the bullet grazed my side. We

wrestled around the room, but he was bigger than I was and he finally shoved me away against the wall. I reached my rifle just as he reloaded. I didn't have time to aim it, our guns struck together as we pointed them at each other and mine went off and he fell across the bed."

Young says that he kept his rifle trained on Freyer who had staggered to his feet and was leaning against the wall for support, and slowly backed out of the small cabin room. He and Hughes then went to the home of a neighbor and summoned a deputy sheriff and at 3 o'clock the next morning started out for Roseburg to surrender. They were met at Oakland by Sheriff Starmer who brought Young on to Roseburg.

Tapp has had a bad reputation in Douglas county. In July 1920 he was arrested for assault and battery on his uncle in the cabin he was killed in and only recently was arrested for operating a still, but was released from justice court in order that the government might take the case. He escaped before the federal officers could arrest him and has since been hiding in the woods.

Young, who is 49 years of age, has been a resident of the Elkton country for the last three years. His wife and two children are visiting relatives at La Crescenta, Calif. He bears a good reputation in that neighborhood.

MINES IN BUTTE, MONT., AGAIN IN OPERATION

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 18.—Four mines of the Anaconda Copper Mining company resumed operations today with full shifts of about 2000 men and other properties in this district increased their forces. Butte and Superior mines and Clark prop-

erties will continue to add workmen, it was announced.

Work at the Anaconda smelters was resumed with a force of 700 men. It was stated that eventually 1800 men will be employed there. Increase of employment at the Great Falls smelters is expected to begin at the end of the week.

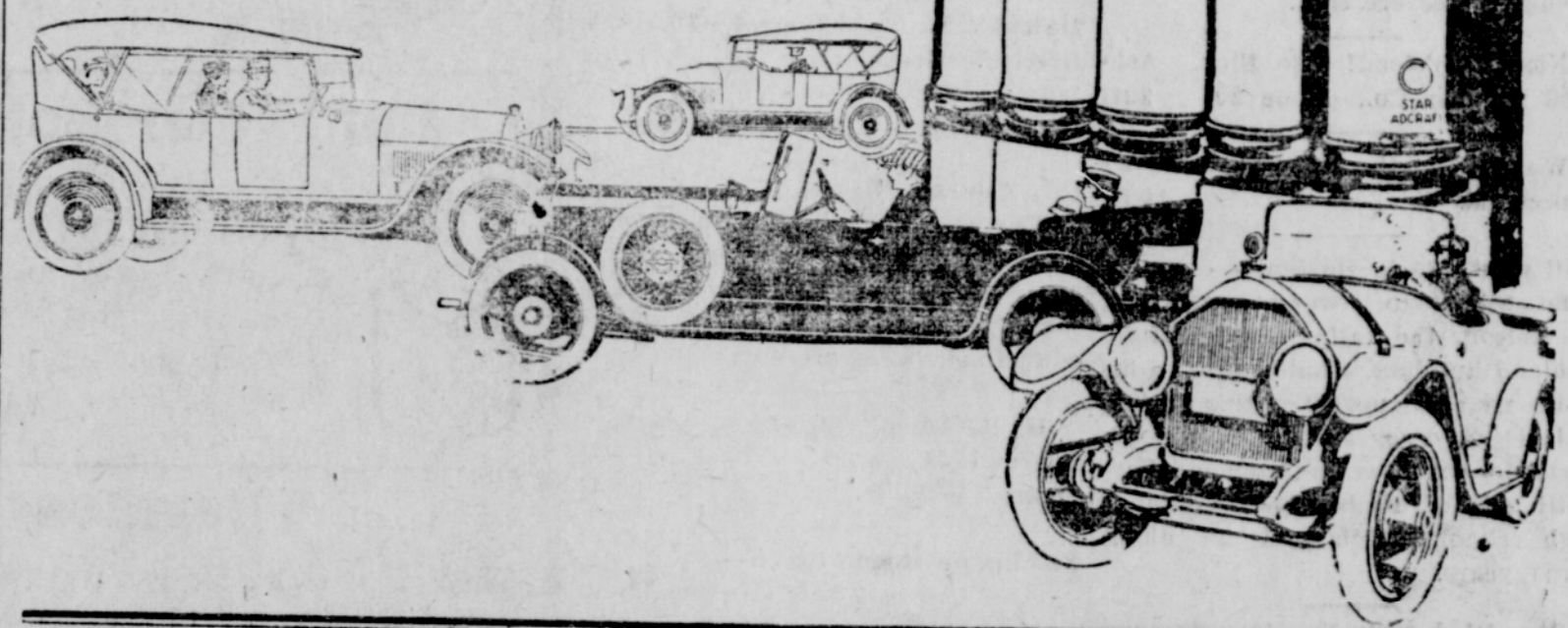
