**DE VALERA STILL ACTIVE IN SOUTHERN IRELAND, SAYS LONDON DISPATCH**

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Considerable unrest still prevails in southern Ireland, according to the Dublin correspondent to the London Times, who intimates that the followers of Eamonn De Valera may be engaged in stimulating disturbances.

"A spirit of extreme republicanism," the correspondent declares, still flames in the south, where large bodies of armed men refuse to accept the treaty between Ireland and Great Britain."

There has been a crime wave sweep over Dublin and outlying districts, following the removal of the English troops, which requires strong measures from the government. Although the whole country will support the provisional government in restoring order, the next few weeks of readjustment will be a difficult time in the island.

DUBLIN, Jan. 20.—Unemployed men seized a meeting hall here last night, formed a volunteer army of four companies, raised the red flag and refused to evacuate, despite orders from the provisional government. About 120 took part in the demonstration.

**BERKELEY, CALIF., FOLKS PUT ON SKATES, SAY S. P. RAILROAD MEN**

Old Man Winter is playing pranks all along the coast, at some places leaving a coat of white crystals over the ground, and even in sunny California, the mecca of sunshine loving tourists, skating has taken the place of sunbaths. So say railroad men from San Francisco, Berkeley and other northern California points.

Eastern Oregon and Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana were shivering with the mercury at the lowest point since 1909, according to officials of the Spokane weather bureau.

In Los Angeles and southern California cities, heavy rains have deluged the country for the past two weeks. Old residents there assert that they have never seen so much rain in their experience in that section.

**PLANS MANY CHANGES IN ORGANIZATION OF GOVERNMENT BUREAUS**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 20.—Plans for the reorganization of the government departments and bureaus were completed today by a special congressional committee charged with the task, Walter F.

Brown, chairman of the committee, announced.

The reorganization plan proposes the consolidation of the army and navy departments into one department of national defense headed by one secretary, with two under secretaries, one for the navy, the other for the army.

The plan also provides for the merging of the labor department into a new department on public welfare. Public health service would be a new bureau under this new department. The public health bureau would have charge of all distilled liquors and wines, now controlled by the internal revenue bureau.

The enforcement of the prohibition law will be turned over to the new bureau of investigation in the department of justice, in which will be merged all the government secret service agents scattered through the various sections.

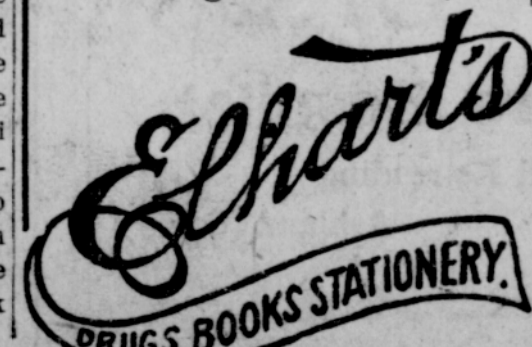
