### Custard Rice Pudding

One-third cup rice, one cup milk, one cup water, one-half teaspoon salt, one tablespoon butter, two eggs, one-half cup scalded milk, one teaspoon vanilla or grated rind and juice of lemon.

Wash rice well, put a cup of milk and a cup of water in a saucepan and bring to the boiling point. Add rice very slowly and cook until soft, adding more liquid if necessary. When cooked, add butter and set aside to cool. Beat eggs, add the additional half cup scalded milk, sugar and flavoring; combine with rice; pour into a buttered baking dish and bake slowly until firm. Pour a little melted butter over the top, sprinkle thickly with powdered sugar and return to oven to glaze. For chocolate rice pudding, melt two squares of unsweetened chocolate and add to the mixture, omitting the flavoring.

### Tapoca Cream

One-third cup pearl tapoca, one cup cold water, two cups scalded milk, two eggs, separated, one-half cup sugar, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one teaspoon vanilla. Soak tapoca in cold water one hour. Add to scalded milk and cook in a double boiler until transparent.

### ELMER W. KILLCRECE

Bronze medal—Killcrece, aged 33, gas engine repairman, attempted to save Ivan Podrebarac from suffocation, Swissvale, Pa., June 5, 1917.

Killcrece, carrying a rope, descended the ladder to the bottom of the pit, lifted Podrebarac and tied the rope around him. He was then overcome and fell on to pot Podrebarac. Killcrece was removed from the pit two minutes later and was revived. (See case of Ivan Podrebarac.)
