SAYS MORE THAN MILLION HINDUS DRILL FOR REVOLT

WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 26.— A force of 1,400,000 men is now drilling in India for revolt against British rule, Sallendra N. Ghose, director of the American commission to promote self-government in India, asserted in an address here.

Ghose is the representative of the Gandhi faction in the threatened revolt. "Despite the wholesale arrests that are being made throughout India, Gandhi and his lieutenants are rapidly gaining strength," Ghose said, basing his information on secret cables from India.
