RURAL SCHOOLS USE STEREOPTICAN SLIDES IN CLASSROOM WORK

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 3.—(Special)—That many rural schools of the state are now using stereoptican lantern slides for classroom instruction is the statement of the extension division of the university, which supplies the public schools of Oregon with an extensive visual instruction service. The slides are used to illustrate and vitalize lessons in history, geography, literature and science, and for community showings, with a local person easily filling the position of lecturer.

In communities where no electric current is available, illumination is secured by means of an acetylene burner fed from a Presto-lite tank. Such equipment, it is declared, affords satisfactory pictures and has the advantage of being within the means of most district schools. The slides themselves are loaned free by the university, the only cost being that of transportation by express or parcel post. In all 180 slide sets, covering a wide range of subjects are available for the use of schools, churches, granges, community centers and other organizations. Educational films, rock and mineral sets, and microscope slides on botany and zoology are also included in the free visual instruction service.
