COOKING PROCESSES Boiling Every housewife should possess a thorough knowledge of the various methods of applying heat to food, which is all that cooking is. There is, for instance, a vast difference between boiling and simmering, and yet much good food has been completely ruined in the cooking because this difference was not understood.

Boiling is the most generally used method of cooking; it is also one of the simplest and most economical. If properly done, boiling renders food both wholesome and digestible. There is also an impression that food will cook faster if the water boils violently. This is not the case, however, for as soon as water bubbles it has reached the boiling point and it does not become any hotter because it boils violently.

Steaming By this method food is cooked in the vapor arising from boiling water, and is the most gradual of all methods. The water under the food must be kept constantly boiling and the steamer containing the food should be closely covered so as to retain all the steam. This gradual heat renders many foods more digestible than when boiled.

Simmering Simmering food is keeping the liquid under the boiling point, a long, slow cooking process. This method is used for meat, soup stocks and for making tender the cheaper.

NOVEL WAYS WITH FRUITS. When oranges, grapefruit, kumquats and lemons are plentiful in the market, we like to use them in other ways, even if we enjoy them best as fresh fruit.

Florida Orange Sticks. — Cream one-quarter of a cupful of butter; add three-quarters of a cupful of sugar and beat until smooth. Then add two egg yolks, one-quarter of a cupful of orange juice and the grated rind of one-half an orange. Mix and sift three-quarters of a cupful of flour, one-quarter of a cupful of cornstarch and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Add to the first mixture, and when well blended fold in the well-beaten whites of two eggs. Grease a shallow pan, sprinkle with powdered sugar and one cupful of finely-chopped walnut meats. Pour in the cake batter and bake in a moderate oven 25 minutes. Remove from the pan, cut in half crosswise and put together with orange filling; cover with orange icing and cut in narrow strips for serving.

Orange Filling.—Cream together one tablespoonful of butter and three tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar. Mix two tablespoonfuls of flour, one-third of a cupful of sugar, one egg yolk until smooth. Add one-quarter of a cupful of orange juice, one teaspoonful of lemon juice, one teaspoonful of grated orange peel, one teaspoonful of lemon juice. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. Add the butter mixture and cool before spreading.

Orange Icing.—Mix the grated rind of one orange with one teaspoonful of lemon juice, one tablespoonful of orange juice and one egg yolk. Beat in confectioner's sugar until the mixture is stiff enough to spread. This will take about one and one-half cupfuls of sugar.
