

following: Vegetable Soup. spoonfuls of but-

Then add four cupfuls of boiling water and allow the soup to simmer gently until the vegetables are tender. Remove flour mixed with a little cold milk, cook, adding salt and pepper, for ten

Cream of Potato Soup .- On a cold of soups. Peel and cut in quarters four potatoes and cook them in boiling salted water until tender. Pour three cupfuls of milk into the upper pan of a double boiler, add one chopped onion and cook ten minutes. Drain the potatoes, mash them through a sleve and add them to the milk with onehalf teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful of paprika and one tablespoonful of flour mixed with two tablespoonfuls of butter. Cook ten minutes, stirring occasionally. Onion, if liked, may be added to the potato while cooking and removed before mashing.


Mutton Broth,-Take three mutton bones, one tablespoonful of rice and six cupfuls of water. Add salt and simmer for five hours. Skim and remove all fat, add pepper and serve hot. This is especially good for chil-

Oyster Blaque.-Cook a pint of chopped oysters in three cupfuls of milk, strain and reserve the milk. Rub the oysters through a sieve, add two tablespoonfuls of flour mixed with two tablespoonfuls of butter, add milk, salt and pepper and cook eight minutes. Add a beaten egg and serve

Utah Shows Largest School Attendance in 5-20 Age Group, and Louisiana Smallest-Growth. 5.1 Per Cent in 10 Years.

For the 7-13 age group the largest proportion of school attendance, 96.1 per cent, is that for Massachusetts, and the smallest, 75.9 per cent for Louisiana. In seven states-Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Ohio, Iowa. Delaware, Idaho and Utah-the proportion was 95 per cent or more.

In Illinois the 5-20 age group is given as numbering 1,886,010. Of these 1,226,601, or 65 per cent, attended school, an increase of 4.8 per cent over the 1910 figures. The 7-13 age group's population totaled 860,832, of whom 815,080, or 94.7 per cent, attendhigher than that of 1910.
