Rules for Safe Driving.

- Keep to the right of the road. Slow down at crossings.
- Signal for a stop or turn to cars behind by holding out the hand.
- Apply brakes slowly. Change speed rates slowly. Drive carefully.
- Be prepared to help any motorist in trouble on roads distant from garages.
- Be prepared to give pedestrians "lifts" on country roads. Stop car and engine when meeting drovers with sheep or cattle on country roads.
- Park only at side of roads, leaving fairway.
- When buying produce in the country, park alongside road, not on the road.
- When parking at night leave warning lights.
- Have headlight dimmers and use them when meeting and passing other motorists at night.

Macnider, American Legion

Hanford Macnider, the new national commander of the American Legion, is an American fighting man of fine physique and appearance. He was born in 1884 at Mason City, Ia., where he is a banker. He was graduated from Harvard in 1911 and served on the Mexican border in 1916 as a first lieutenant in the Iowa National Guard. After the outbreak of the World war he entered the officers' training camp at Fort Snelling and was commissioned second lieutenant. He arrived in France September 20, 1917, as an officer in the Ninth United States Infantry. During his overseas service he was promoted to major and later became lieutenant colonel of Infantry in the Alsne, Marne, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne operations, a portion of the time in command of his regiment. He was wounded at St. Mihiel, and holds the following decorations. Distinguished Service Cross and one cluster, Chevalier de Legion d'Honneur, Croix de Guerre (five citations, five palms, one fold and one silver star) and the Italian war cross. Macnider was elected commander of the Iowa department of the Legion in September and has been commander of the Clausen Worden post of Mason City. His name was put forward for national commander at Minneapolis in 1919 and in the balloting he stood next to Franklin D'Olier. He has been a vigorous exponent of adjusted compensation for all ex-service men.



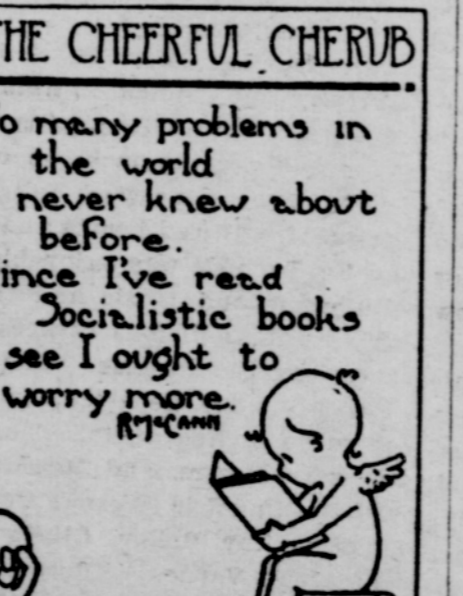

SOME SPECIALS IN GOOD THINGS.

A tasty salad which may be prepared any time in the year, but is especially good at this season is Fruit Salad.—Pour a cupful of boiling water over half a pound of dates, drain dry and cut in eighths removing the stones. Add to the dates one cupful of finely cubed, good flavored apple; two slices of minced pineapple, the apple and pine may be cut in strips if preferred, sprinkle with salt and two tablespoonfuls of French dressing and one-half cupful of finely cut celery. Let stand an hour then serve with mayonnaise and whipped cream using a cupful of cream to two tablespoonfuls of mayonnaise. Serve in apple cups on lettuce. Kumquat Salad.—Wash twelve kumquats and cut cross wise in thin slices. Mix with one cupful of white grapes cut in half and seeded, add one orange divided into sections and broken into halves. Make a dressing of two tablespoonfuls of grape fruit juice, one tablespoonful of lemon juice, a teaspoonful of powdered sugar, a dash of cayenne and salt to taste. Arrange on lettuce and serve very cold with the dressing poured over it. Raisin Roly Poly.—Raisins are one of our most wholesome fruits as they furnish assimilable iron in a most desirable form. Take one cupful each of chopped raisins and apple. Prepare a roll of pastry, roll very thin and heap the fruit in the center. Pinch up and overlap, having the laps on the top. Place in a deep baking dish, pour over one cupful each of brown sugar and boiling water, two tablespoonfuls of butter. Bake an hour in a slow oven, basting occasionally. Lemon Raisin Pie.—Take one cupful of large raisins, add one cupful of sugar, one large lemon, juice and grated rind; a tablespoonful of flour, a cupful of water, one tablespoonful of butter. Bake with two crusts.
