McCumber: Where He Stands

Senator McCumber of North Dakota (portrait herewith) has been selected by the committee on committees as chairman of the senate finance committee to succeed the late Boies Penrose. Senator Frelinghuysen (Rep.) of New Jersey was selected to fill the vacancy on the finance committee.



Senator McCumber furnishes just twenty-one words of autobiography to the Congressional Directory: "Porter James McCumber, Republican, of Wahpeton; lawyer; elected to United States Senate 1899; reelected in 1905, in 1911, and in 1916." He says of his selection: "Speaking personally, while I am aware that I have often been considered as too ultra-conservative to satisfy the views of some elements of the West, it is news to me to be informed through some of our eastern journals that I am dangerously radical. Standing between these two viewpoints, I derive some consolation from the fact that I know myself exactly where I stand. I am a protectionist, but not a spotted one. I am a conservative, and must remain so. I believe in progress and in keeping abreast of the time. But I want to progress upward and not downward, forward and not backward. The same conservative and businesslike course that prevents disaster and assures success in business enterprises is just as applicable in the conduct of national affairs."

French Girl's Letters Cause Divorce

OTAWA, ILL.—Letters saturated with love, written to Dr. A. J. Weirick of Marseilles, Ill., by a French girl he met and loved overseas during the war, were produced yesterday in court by the doctor's wife of twenty years' standing, and won her a divorce and \$10,000 alimony. Dr. Weirick, physician with a wide circle of friends, did not appear to contest the action.



When the United States declared war Dr. Weirick enlisted in the medical corps, was commissioned a captain, and sent overseas. When the war was won, Captain Weirick returned, but unfortunately for his future marital peace, brought with him in a trunk many letters written to him by a certain French girl, who, his wife asserted yesterday, was Marguerite, Queen of Lemon, France. The billets doux were read, a few of them, in court. Here are samples, signed "Guette," French diminutive for Marguerite: "I have a very nice white dog, which I love, because he is just like a baby. Oh, how I would like to have a baby who was yours, too. I hope to have one in a year. Don't you like you?"

Another reads: "My lover, I just received your two letters and the money. I thank you, darling. Really, I was very sad, because I had no letters. I thought you had forgotten me. I know, lover, you are not the same as the others, and I am sure you will come back to take your little girl, who loves you so much, and I hope you love also. Don't forget, my lover, think you, and be sure I am always and forever your little girl, who loves you." "GUETTE."
