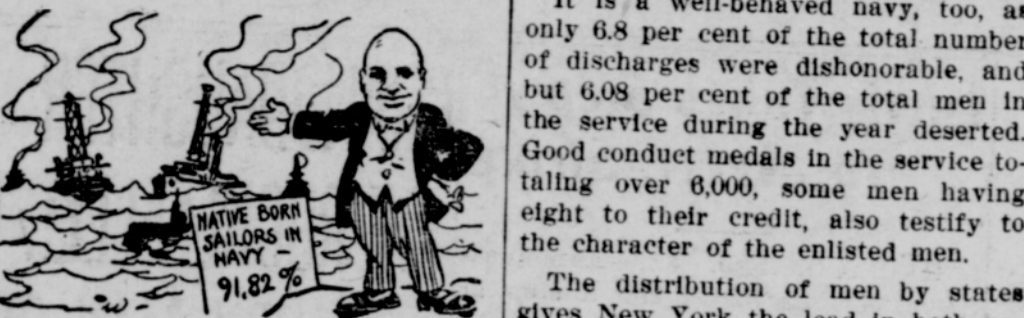

Navy Is Nearly 100 Per Cent American



WASHINGTON — The United States navy is 99.7 per cent pure American. Secretary Denby is proud of his navy and said that it was the best navy in the world, backing his statement by figures recently compiled by the bureau of navigation, which show that on July 1 native-born sailors represented 91.82 per cent; naturalized men, 2.99 per cent; colonial natives, 4.89 per cent, and the remainder aliens. The last-named number only 352 men. At the end of the fiscal year the navy comprised 119,205 men, of which number 109,457 were natives, 5,829 were born in Guam, Samoa, the Philippines or Virgin Islands, and 8,567 were naturalized citizens.

Citizen of Big City Secretly Proud of What Visitors Universally Denominate a Nuisance.

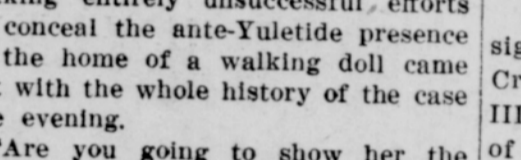

Ancient Abbey to Be Redressed for Wedding

LONDON, Feb. 21.—When Princess Mary is married at Westminster Abbey—the first child of an English king to be married there since 1269—the ancient cathedral will be completely transformed.

Raised staging in the nave has been hastily set up in order to enlarge the accommodation. Elaborate scaffolding is being erected to give a view to still more guests. Hundreds of men have been at work cleansing thoroughly the old-time edifice and the grime of generations has been removed.

Along the wide path between tiers of seats, the bridal procession will walk the whole length of the nave, through the choir and into the sanctuary, where the wedding will be celebrated.

The steps of the sanctuary, where the bridal couple will stand, were laid with the most beautiful mosaic by the Abbot Ware. They have now been beautifully polished by men specially sent from South Kensington museum, and the east windows, which were taken down during the air raids, have been specially replaced for the wedding.

The wedding register will be signed on the tomb of Edmund Crouchback, second son of Henry III, curiously enough the last child of an English sovereign to be married in the Abbey.

the Archbishop of Canterbury—and it will be the last official act of this venerable prelate—assisted by the Archbishop of York and the Dean of Westminster. The choir, which has been rehearsing for several weeks, has been drawn from the finest choristers throughout Britain, and the music will be of a character unequalled in the traditions of the Abbey.

Near to the sanctuary will be stationed the foreign royalties, diplomats, the cabinet, representatives of European monarchs, representatives of the navy, army and air forces; the lord mayors of the principal cities and representatives of the houses of parliament, together with personal friends of the bridegroom.

Diplomats and members of the services will be in full uniform. Ladies will wear evening dress, with jewels and tiaras; and men not in uniform will wear court dress, with swords and black silk knee breeches. Directions as to dress will be printed on the invitation cards. The latter will be printed on large white cards, with the royal arms in gold at the top.

The service will follow the lines of the English prayer book, including the promise to "obey," and the only alteration will be that the exhortation will be slightly less crude than the version ordinarily in use. The entire ceremony will occupy about 45 minutes. When it is over the bride and the bridegroom will drive back by way of Whitehall—where the great government offices will be almost hidden by bunting—and the Mall to Buckingham palace, where the wedding reception will be held.
