THE OUTLOOK

There is general agreement among thoughtful and experienced men of affairs that the outlook for 1922 is much more promising than that of a year ago. As one careful analyst suggests, the basic conditions are essentially sounder and with strengthening of the country's credit structure, the nation "is much better fortified to work out its economic salvation in this year of revived courage." Consistent deflation has brought us to the substantial foundations of real prosperity and progress. Upon all sides the opinion is held that 1922 is going to witness a return of industry to normal. We are now getting our feet squarely upon the ground. There has been much debt-paying during the last year. The decks are being cleared for the expected activities of business in the coming months.

LOCKING UP THE LIQUOR

The bureau of internal revenue is reported proposing the concentration of the 38,000,000 gallons of pre-war whiskey in "the few theft-proof warehouses," thereby killing two birds with one stone as the concentration would reduce the cost of guarding the liquor by \$500,000 a year.

It will be news that there are theft-proof warehouses. The impression from events has been that they were impossible. According to the usual reports warehouse thefts, where the goods were in charge of the government officials, were due, not so much to the insecurity of the buildings, as the weakness of the human provisions for keeping the goods in the building. If that is correct mere theft-proof warehouses will avail nothing against forged permits and the countless other devices for getting the forbidden liquid out of the warehouses.

There might, however, be something in the revised maxim of putting all one's eggs in one basket and watching that basket. Perhaps that is what the bureau has in mind, but if so why confuse the proposal with chatter about theft-proof warehouses?

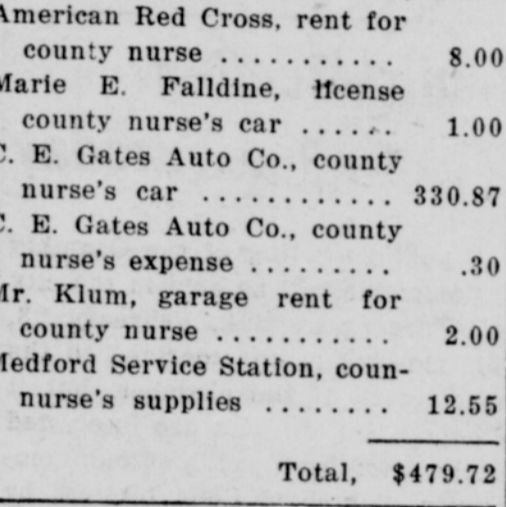
