EX-KAISER BILL PLANNED TO SKIP AWAY TO BRAZIL

RIO DE JANEIRO, Feb. 24.—The German ex-kaiser planned to flee from his Holland exile to Brazil, but was foiled by the allies. It was discovered when fac similes of a Brazilian passport issued to William Hohenzollern were produced here. The ex-warlord evidently planned to become a naturalized Brazilian, according to the form of the papers, which describe him as:

"Senor Gullherme Hohenzollern, naturalized citizen of Brazil, married, 60, white, white beard and moustache, profession, kaiser."

The passport said its bearer had no characteristic signs, overlooking Wilhelm's left arm, which is withered. Apparently it was the pride of the former monarch which caused this omission.

"Energetic intervention" by the allies caused withdrawal of the passport.
