FARMERS SHOULD ORGANIZE

The spread of the idea of co-operative marketing during the past few years has been remarkable. Starting in a small way in localities where conditions demanded a change

from the old system of marketing, co-operation spread until now it is nation-wide. The post-war conditions which worked a hardship on the producer, really promoted this marketing method. When the plight of the farmer was beginning to make itself felt generally, and co-operation of producers appeared to be the only way to sustain production, those who have the building up of America's agriculture at heart began to devise ways of legalizing this method, so that such organizations might not be handicapped by subsequent suits and trials. Many of the states have passed measures putting their stamp of approval on co-operation of producers. There will no doubt be many other states pass similar bills now that the federal government is leading the way.

The farmer has for years been the object of educational campaigns, but in the present case, he is turning the table and is educating government officials and the lawmakers of the country.

The farm bureau is fostering the

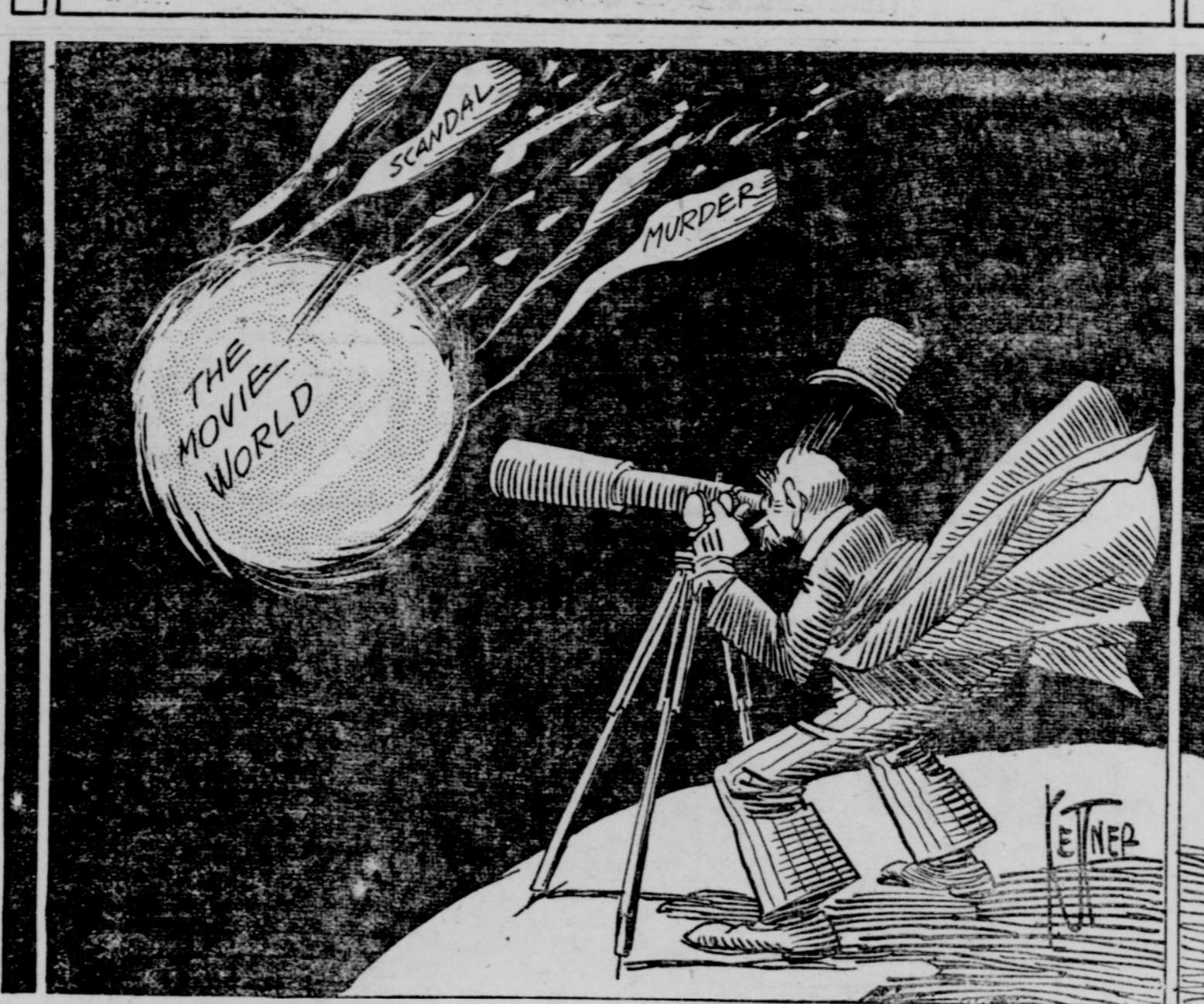
producers' marketing organizations of a truly co-operative type because it is felt that through this method alone can agriculture be saved and

If the merchant finds himself in possession of a few suits and coats at the end of a season, that for some reason have not been sold, he is usually willing to sacrifice them. They may be among the most desirable garments that he purchased, but if cash means more to him than stock on hand he will cut more than the profit out of such merchandise—and this is the bargain hunter's opportunity. It is good business to pick up these unusual values, if the garments are made of staple materials and in conservative styles.

In choosing a suit, a straight-line coat, like the one pictured, a box model or a simply cut and loose-fitting one, with a plain skirt comfortably wide, will line up with the suits of any season, and not suffer by comparison.

Suits of this kind are easy to remodel, when the time comes for changing them, and will prove satisfactory for more than one season. Black and navy blue are the best in colors, but certain shades of dark brown and dark gray are also dependable, and the less decoration the better on suits that are to see long service.
