FAMOUS ABBEY WITNESSES MARRIAGE OF A KING'S DAUGHTER FIRST TIME

LONDON, Feb. 28.—New history was made today in Westminster Abbey, shrine of Britain's history. For the first time the great grayed walls of the ancient abbey looked down upon the marriage of a king's daughter.

The royal wedding was in the midst of historic shadows. It was solemnized at the sacarium and high altar, flanked by the tombs of Edmund Crouchback and Aveline. The mosaic pavement upon which the principal personages stood during the ceremony was brought to England from Rome by Richard de Ware, one of the medieval abbots of Westminster. The altar before which stood the bride and bridegroom is another relic of history, vested with an ingot of gold, an offering made by the bride's father at his coronation. The wonderful altar cloth also was an offering of King George, an example of England's finest embroidery. Other vestments of the altar are rich with historic connections. The paintings, tapestries and carvings of the Abbey are far too numerous for recounting. The tombs of honored dead, in whose shadow the wedding ceremony was performed, are the tombs of England's great. From the Jerusalem chamber, where the clergy donned their vestments, to the shrine of St. Edward the Confessor, in Saints' chapel, surrounded by the tombs of Plantagenet kings, where the Abbey marriage register was signed, today's ceremony smacked of history.

Pepper Gets Penrose's Seat



George Wharton Pepper, Philadelphia lawyer, has been appointed United States senator by Governor Sproul of Pennsylvania to succeed the late Bofes Penrose. Under the law the appointment stands until a successor is selected at the November election to fill the unexpired Penrose term ending in 1927.

Senator Pepper is recognized as one of the ablest constitutional lawyers in the country. He is fifty-five years old, having been born in Philadelphia March 16, 1867. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1887 and received the degree of doctor of laws from the University of Pennsylvania and Yale. In 1890 he married Charlotte R. Fisher. For years he was a lecturer at Yale and he is a trustee of the University of Pennsylvania and of Carnegie institute.

New U. S. Veterans' Vocational Schools

OPENING of the United States Veterans' Bureau Vocational schools at Chillicothe, O., formerly Camp Sherman, marks the inauguration of a new policy in rehabilitating the disabled veterans.

Formerly the trainees were farmed out to various institutions. The veterans now will be taken out of these schools and placed in the government institution at Chillicothe. The government will not take students out of accredited universities and colleges where veterans' bureau trainees are taking professional courses. The school at Chillicothe is being rapidly equipped with modern laboratories and shops for classes in electrical work, printing, steam-fitting, engraving, carpentry, architecture and bookbinding, as well as courses along agriculture, animal husbandry, dairying, cheese and cream making, forestry and similar lines. The closest attention will be paid to the health of these disabled veterans. A modern hospital will be maintained on the campus, with an adequate medical and nursing staff.

PRUNES—Continued
Sunsweet Prunes—Stewed
Wash Sunsweet prunes, cover with warm water and soak for several hours, over night if possible. Heat slowly in water (in which they were soaked) to simmering point and cook under boiling point until tender. Rapid cooking destroys the flavor and appearance of the fruit. Prunes may be flavored with a small stick of cinnamon or a little lemon or orange peel. Slow cooking develops the natural fruit sugars and little if any sugar is required; if sugar is used, add after prunes are cooked but while still hot; or remove prunes and add sugar to juice and simmer until juice is somewhat thickened. A fireless cooker is excellent for cooking prunes. Soak as directed above; then heat to the boiling point and set in the fireless cooker (with-out a heated stone) for several hours.
Sunsweet Prune Juice
Wash Sunsweet prunes, cover with warm water and let stand over night. Heat very slowly to simmering point, cook until tender; don't boil. No sugar is required. Pour off juice, straining through a fine sieve. The prunes left can be used for prune desserts requiring prune pulp.
Sunsweet Baked Prunes
Wash Sunsweet prunes, cover with warm water and soak over night. Bake in a casserole in a slow oven, using water fruit was soaked in. Cook until tender. No sugar is required. When serving, use plain or add boiled custard sauce or whipped cream.
Sunsweet Prune Pudding, Delmonico
One cup cooked Sunsweet prunes, two cups scalding milk, four level tablespoons cornstarch; one-third cup sugar; two egg yolks; one teaspoon butter, one teaspoon vanilla. For meringue two egg whites, four tablespoons sugar, half teaspoonful vanilla. Put Sunsweet prunes with a little juice in a pudding dish. Scald milk in a double boiler; mix sugar and cornstarch until well blended; add to hot milk and cook 15 minutes. Pour over the beaten yolks of eggs and mix well. Turn the custard over the prunes. Beat the egg whites until stiff; beat in gradually two tablespoons of sugar; fold in remaining sugar; add vanilla. Spread on top of pudding and bake in a very moderate oven about eight minutes. Serve hot or cold.

UTAH MAN WINS TRAP HANDICAP

Gus L. Becker, a wealthy sportsman of Ogden, Utah, is the handicap king of the 1921 trapshooting season. The distance handicap records, issued recently by Stoney McLinn, secretary of the American Trapshooting association, give Becker the splendid average of .9470 on 775 registered handicap targets, which is nearly a full point better than the average credited to the second man on the list.
