**Income Tax Facts**  
Former soldiers and sailors, in filing an income-tax return for 1921, should not include as gross income any amount received under the provisions of the war risk insurance and vocational rehabilitation acts and as pensions or military or naval service during the war.

**The special exemption of \$3500** formerly allowed soldiers and sailors in active service is not continued by the revenue act of 1921. "Persons in active military or naval service of the United States," are allowed only the exemptions granted other individuals, \$1000 if single (or if married and not living with husband or wife); \$2500 if married and the combined net income of husband and wife was \$5000 or less; and \$2000 if married and the combined net income of husband and wife was more than \$5000.

**An unmarried soldier, sailor, marine or ex-service man must file a return** if his net income from all sources for 1921 was \$1000 or more or if his gross income was \$5000 or more. If married and living with his wife on December 31, 1921, he must file a return if the net income of himself and wife and dependent minor children was \$2000 or more, or if the combined gross income was \$5000 or more.

**INCOME TAX FACTS**

**JOBS FOR GIRLS IN ENGLAND GROW LESS**  
(By International News Service)  
LONDON, March 2.—High grade employment is becoming increasingly difficult for ambitious girls to get, according to a statement made by the ministry of labor.

"Banks and insurance companies," says the secretary of the ministry, "will only take girls as stenographers, though there are ambitious girls with a good education fit for better work than this."

"All the same, the only field for girls in England today, lies in the wholesale and retail needlework trades."

"But even then, firms in these trades will only take girls ready to start at the lowest rung and work up."

"There should be plenty of scope in dress and millinery designing, and there are plenty of girls with originality and talent in these directions. But who ever hears of a famous woman designer? Men seem to have the monopoly entirely."
