Gov. Small Faces Trial to Eight Theft Charge

 WAUKEGAN, Ill., March 4.—Len Small, governor of Illinois, will go on trial in Lake county circuit court here Monday on the charge of conspiracy to embezzle state funds. The trial is expected to attract nationwide attention.

Attorneys estimated today that the trial will take ten weeks. Fifty veniremen will be on hand Monday when the case opens, and the same number will be ready for questioning for jury service the following day. It is the contention in some quarters that it will be with the greatest difficulty that a jury will be obtained.

Judge Claire C. Edwards, before whom the trial will be held, is of a different opinion, however. He does not believe it will require long to obtain a jury. Each side is to be allowed six peremptory challenges, which does not give much leeway, although the court may allow many challenges for cause.

Has 300 Witnesses
 James H. Wilkerson, assistant attorney general, said that the state has about 300 witnesses. He said the case will be largely a documentary one and that, consequently, it may proceed slowly. He expressed the belief that the procuring of a jury would be a lengthy affair, citing the fact that it required six weeks to get a jury in the famous Orpet case, which was tried in the same court.

The Orpet trial, nevertheless, was dissimilar, it was pointed out by others. In that case Will H. Orpet was tried for the murder of Marlon

Lambert, a school girl, who was found mysteriously poisoned in a snow-covered woods.

Governor Small stoutly maintains that he is innocent of any wrongdoing, and that the charge against him are the result of a "political conspiracy." When he was arraigned before Judge Edwards late in January he entered a plea, through his attorney, of "Not Guilty."

Governor Says "Innocent"
 Ever since his indictment by the Sangamon county grand jury on July 20, 1921, he has professed his innocence. Originally he was named in three indictments charging him with conspiracy to defraud the state of Illinois of \$2,000,000 of the taxpayer's money and embezzling jointly with Lieutenant Governor Fred E. Sterling and Vernon Curtis, a banker of Grant Park, Ill., \$700,000 of interest on public funds. Subsequently after months of court actions, the embezzlement indictment against the governor was knocked out in a decision by Judge Edwards in Lake county circuit court, to which court Small and Curtis had taken a change of venue. Only one conspiracy indictment was permitted to stand against the state's chief executive, and a number of counts in this indictment were knocked out.

The entire experience of the governor with the case since the original indictments was described by the governor's friends as "humiliating" and "political persecution." Probably the most humiliating experience of all to the governor was his arrest in Springfield three weeks after the first indictments were issued.
