Surgical Safety

The Sanitarium was established because there was no scientific equipment nor attempts to do thorough and careful work in any hospital in the Rogue River valley. As well and as rapidly as possible the Sanitarium was equipped with up-to-date surgical and diagnostic apparatus.

The whole hospital has been reorganized and "standardized." The policies of the hospital are under the direct control of a staff of physicians selected from the Jackson county Medical Society. This supervision is so close that no operations which are not absolutely necessary and essential for the well-being of the patient are tolerated.

This means that every physician operating in this hospital is constantly subjected to constructive criticism and that no half-baked diagnosis is permitted and that no operation can

possibly be "pulled off" which is not on an absolutely honest basis.

Whenever at all indicated such laboratory examinations as blood counts and x-ray studies must be made before operation. This conduces to the safety of the sick and forces all physicians to keep abreast of medical and surgical progress. This non-sectarian staff supervises all of the activities of the institution.

One of the cardinal principles governing every "standardized" hospital is that no one man can do the best work and that free and frequent consultation is essential to the well-being of the sick and also to the scientific advancement of the physicians and surgeons.

To give the public the services of a hospital at least the equal of any in the state of Oregon is the reason why major operations done in the Rogue River valley should be done at the Sacred Heart hospital. With full support patients can have the best of board, room, and nursing at much less cost than in a smaller and non-standardized institution.

Far from being closed, the Sanitarium has been improved and the X-ray facilities have been increased. Cause of Recent Fire on 2nd Street

It might be of interest to the people of this vicinity to know how the fire in the Willis property at the corner of Second and B streets originated a few days ago. While the fire did very little damage, only the prompt arrival of the fire department prevented a fire that might have caused a great deal of damage.

The direct cause of the fire was the crossing of two electric light wires, causing what electricians call a "short." With the proper fuses in the proper places, when a wire becomes shorted, one of the fuses will be burned out, thereby deadening all wires beyond the fuses. In the case of the Willis house someone had at some time placed a penny under each of the fuses, in this way making the fuses of absolutely no value.

When the wire were shorted, instead of burning out the fuses as intended, the current continued to come into the house, and the wires got so hot near the point of the short that the

covering of the wires started to burn. This would have in time caught the wood work of the house, and until the current was cut off, it would have continued to burn without regard to how much water or chemical might be applied.

Another item of interest to property owners is the fact that without proper fuses, all insurance that any one may carry will be of no value to the insurer, for the insurance companies recognize the value of proper fuses, and cases of the kind mentioned above would certainly be thoroughly investigated before any insurance would be paid.

Civilization Traced in Coins. Man first had an opportunity to call "heads or tails" more than 2,200 years ago, when the practice of stamping a head on coins was instituted by the Greeks, with the likeness of Alexander the Great. Some of these ancient Greek coins are valuable as art objects alone, the embossing being of rare workmanship and surpassing anything to be seen on the coinage of today. It is naturally an example of the great height which Greek culture reached in that day.

The course of civilization, in fact, can easily be traced in these coins. The Roman coinage, some of which bears the head of Nero, is not equal in beauty to that of the Greek, but nevertheless shows a high quality of art.
