JACKSON COUNTY PIONEER SUCCUMBS OF HEART FAILURE

MEDFORD, March 10.—George Roberts, father of Mrs. Ed Hughes and Dr. Frank Roberts, all of Jackson county, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Hughes, Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Death was due to valvular heart trouble. Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:30 at the Presbyterian church in Phoenix, Weeks-Conger, undertakers, in charge.

Mr. Roberts was quite well known in Ashland and throughout Jackson county.

The City Meat market, on East Main street, which has been operated for the last few months by J. M. Grimley, has changed hands. O. C. Goodlett has bought the business and leased the building for one year. Mr. Goodlett has been operating the Fourth Street market for the last five months and decided that he could operate the two places to better advantage than he could the one place alone. The Main street shop will be improved and equipped so that a larger amount of meat may be taken care of at all times.

W. T. Mason will have charge of the shop for the present, and will weigh up the meat for what he hopes will be satisfied customers.

RADIO OPERATOR FLASHES JESTS AS VESSEL SINKS

NEW YORK, March 10.—"We are sinking stern first. The boats are smashed. Can't hold out longer. The skipper dictated that and he ought to know. Where is my hat? Sorry couldn't wait for you. Pressing business elsewhere. Skoll!"

And this was the last word from the wireless operator of the Norwegian tramp steamer Grontoft, as the ship went down with 30 men aboard, in a raging hurricane in mid-Atlantic.

Officers of the Danish steamer Estonia, which arrived in New York Wednesday, told how the Grontoft operator sent out his S. O. S. calls, mingled with grim jests, for hours, while the Estonia was battling her way towards the sinking ship. The Estonia arrived too late, and not a trace remained of the Grontoft.

"The old man thinks it may breeze up by night," said the operator of the Grontoft.

And again, "The old wagon has a list like a rundown heel. This is no night to be out without an umbrella."

The Grontoft sailed from Norfolk on February 20 for Esbjerg.
