God save the mark! The most distinguishing feature of the Chamber of Commerce for the past two years has been its failure to function on the matters of real concern to the city. It is a reflection on the intelligence of Ashland's citizenship that they should be asked to believe any such tommyrot. Is there a single individual on that ticket who has not at one time or another been identified with public interests? Are they the character of men who are likely to have a ring put through their noses and led around by any individual? Answer the question yourself when you cast your vote.

As for the threat that if they are elected, the Chamber of Commerce will cease to function—well, if there has been any marked evidence of its functioning on matters of the gravest concern to Ashland for the past two years, except with a knife and fork, it is scarce visible to the naked eye, but possibly might yield to microscopic inspection.  
 If loss of public interest to the extent of permitting the membership to dwindle from 528 to 72, is functioning, then have they functioned with a vengeance, and are justly entitled to the honor. Or perhaps, we are overlooking the fact that they have functioned to the extent of expending \$10,000 in the past year and almost tie the record for the greatest number of luncheons held by any Chamber of Commerce in the state.  
 Function, indeed! It is small wonder that the secretary swelled up with pride almost to the bursting point when he read the annual report and pointed to that record of achievement.

**PEOPLE'S FORUM**

To the editor of the Tidings:  
 A few years ago there appeared on the Chautauquus platform in the city of Ashland, an artist with rare genius, and as he talked, to his vast audience, under the magic spell of his brush as it moved over the canvas,

there would appear a mountain, then a valley, a turbulent stream would appear rushing down the hill side. In a very short time he would hold up before his audience the finished picture. If I had the skill of this unique artist, I should like to bring before the people of Ashland two pictures painted on one large canvas.

As my brush moved over the canvas at the upper right hand corner appears old, snow-capped Mount Ashland with the last rays of a glorious sunset lingering on its summit, and painting the sky in gorgeous colors. As my brush moved down the canvas the nearer mountains and canyon appear clothed in shadows, while the city of Ashland in the valley below appears dimly, as in a state of repose, all unmindful of the scene above it. At the left of this picture, or representing the entrance to the city, a closed gate. The name of the finished picture appears at the lower part of the canvas—"The City Lies Sleeping."

The companion picture begins to appear on the right hand side of the canvas. Under the magic strokes of the brush there appears in the distance the same jeweled setting of mountains and canyon, only in this picture Mount Ashland's hoary head is emblazoned with the rays of the morning sun which appears over the tops of the distant mountains.

The brush moves on and there appears at the gate of the sleeping city a beautiful maiden robed in white, on her head a crown on which is printed the word "Opportunity."

With one hand she is knocking at the gate, while with the other she is pointing upwards. Suddenly near the uplifted hand, there appears a very large modern tourist hotel. As the brush moves on over near the distant mountains, there appears beautiful homes with well-kept orchards, streets lined with business blocks. At the extreme left of the picture appears a vast dome. The brush moves on. The finished building becomes a large school building. The sign over the gate proclaims "Southern Oregon State Normal School." Factories are appearing, a dehydrating plant, hospitals, churches, other hotels, while interspersed are beautiful homes with well-kept lawns, flowers in abundance, trees are appearing. Everywhere the streets are bordered with beautiful shade trees, and, last but not least, there appears in the foreground of the picture, an up-to-date Southern Pacific depot. Again the brush moves on and at the top of this picture, mingling with the rays of the morning sun, are these letters "O-P-P-O-R-T-U-N-I-T-Y." At the lower part of the picture appears the name—"The Awakened City, or Greater Ashland."

Fellow citizens of Ashland, do not think that I have drawn largely upon my imagination in trying to sketch the above pictures. My effort is to point out to you what has been brought about in other cities with less scenic attractions than Ashland possesses.
