PANTRY EMERGENCY SHELF HOW TO USE CANNED GOODS A very well organized household should be provided with a variety of canned goods. Not only for emergencies, but for convenience, canned food should have a permanent place in every household. They offer the housewife an opportunity to furnish the family with a variety of foods in seasons when the market cannot supply that need. They often save her reputation as a cook when the unexpected guest arrives.

The old-fashioned prejudice against commercial canned goods has long been a thing of the past. Science has made the modern canner the last word in cleanliness, sanitation and sterilization. Only fresh, firm products are used and these are prepared under the direction of experts who thoroughly understand the art of canning.

Canned fruits have always been in favor, but due mainly to careless preparation, canned vegetables are not so popular with many persons. They require more consideration than just opening the can and heating.

Foods packed in tin require different treatment than those canned in glass. Too much importance cannot be urged upon removing foods from the tin the instant they are opened. Foods packed in glass will not require instant removal from the container.

If possible, open canned vegetables some little time before cooking, drain off all the liquid, except corn and tomatoes, and rinse in cold water. This freshens and removes most of the canned flavor objectionable to many people. Some authorities will claim that this is not an economy for some of the desirable elements are in the liquid. In a measure this is true, but as we are not living on canned vegetables exclusively, we can afford to make this sacrifice in favor of flavor. If simply to be heated, use only a tablespoonful of not water, or just enough to prevent burning, season with butter, salt and pepper, and place over a kettle of hot water or over a very low fire until thoroughly hot. Corn is always better if heated in a double boiler or set in a kettle of hot water. First add the desired amount of milk to kettle, bring to the scalding point; then add corn and seasonings. The corn will not lump nor stick to the kettle cooked by this method.

All canned fish and meats should be stored in a cool place. Most of these foods are surrounded with a jelly, and if the meat or fish is warm the jelly is melted when the can is opened, giving the food a sticky, unappetizing appearance. If the can is chilled before it is opened the jelly will be firm and the meat easily sliced. Remove all skins and bones from fish and if canned in oil, drain this off. If the oil is used in pre-

paring a fish dish, it will usually impart a strong flavor not particularly desirable. Shrimps, crabs and lobsters are usually inclosed in a cloth bag to prevent discoloration from contact with the tin.

Many housewives consider condiments and relishes, such as Worcestershire sauce, chow-chow, picaililli, chili sauce, pickles and tomato catsup, as merely an accompaniment of meats. But add a small quantity of these highly seasoned relishes in the plain brown gravy or white sauce and you will have an appetizing, piquant sauce for fish, shell fish and self-over slices of roast meat. A rather flat, tasteless sauce may be redeemed with a dash of Worcestershire.

Canned soups are a wonderful convenience. Besides they supply a hot soup at a moment's notice and provide a base for sauces for left-over dishes.

For the housewife who does not keep a stock pot on hand all the time, the canned product will be found invaluable. Chicken broth and consommé are the soups especially adapted to the making of sauces.

What could be more wholesome or appetizing than canned fruit, jam or jelly. The housewife who has a variety of canned fruits always at hand will never be embarrassed if she has had no opportunity to prepare a dessert. In fact, the fruit is really more wholesome than the pudding or pie and so much less trouble.

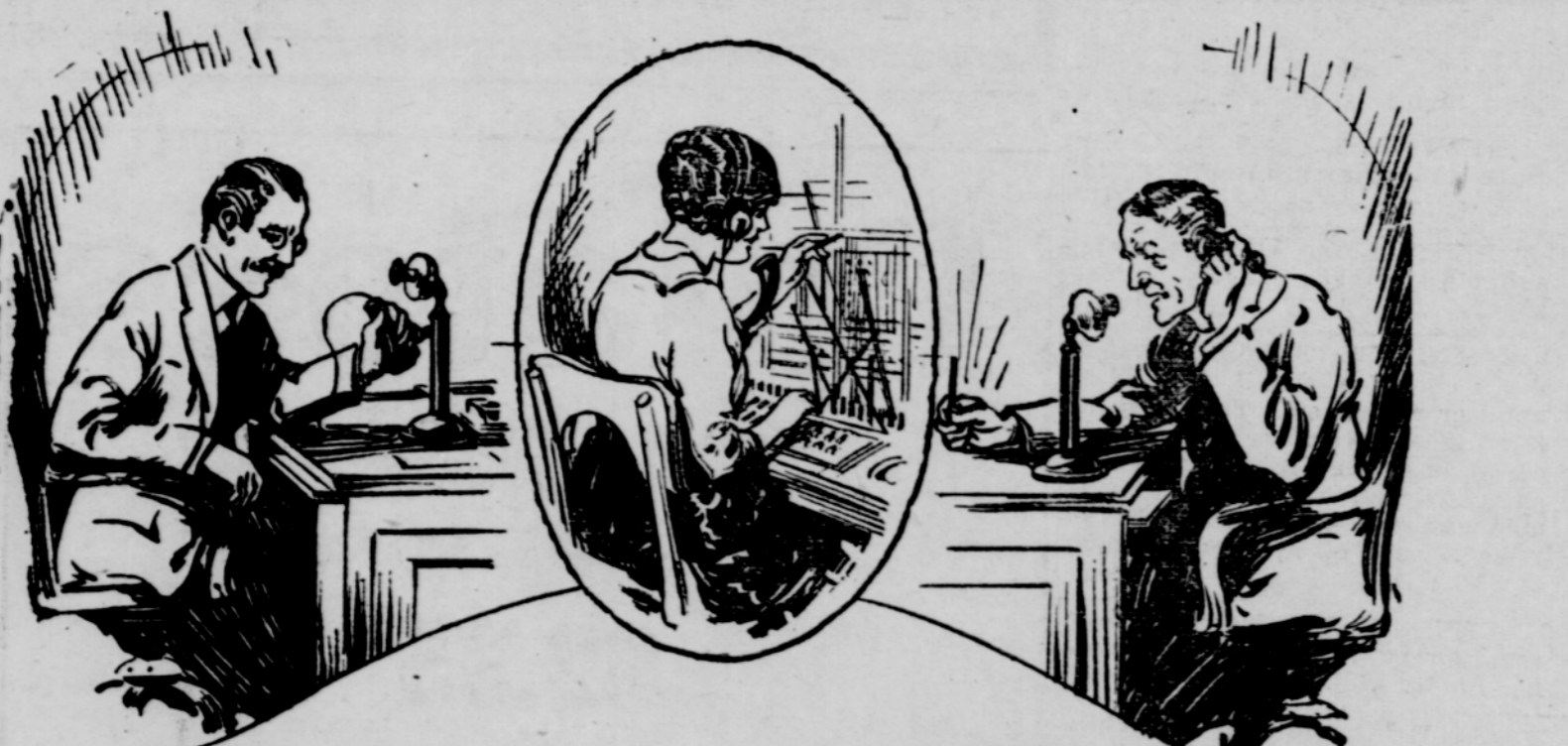
