Pour half of the mixture into a wet mold and chill. Soften a package of cream cheese with a little cream and form into balls. When the mixture begins to stiffen arrange the balls of cheese in the jelly; add the remainder of the gelatin mixture and set on ice until stiff. When ready to serve unmold on a bed of lettuce and serve with mayonnaise dressing.

Tomatoes Stuffed With Pineapple,-Peel medium-sized tomatoes; cut a slice from the top of each and remove the seeds and pulp. Sprinkle the inside with salt and fill with pineapple which has been drained and mixed with nuts and mayonnaise. Arrange the tomatoes on the lettuce; garnish with half of a walnut meat with mayonnaise dressing.

Pineapple and Cucumber Salad .-Drain one cupful of crushed pineapple; add one cupful of finely-diced cucumber, a teaspoonful of onion juice. all mixed with enough mayonnaise to be well seasoned. Add salt, cayenne and paprika. Serve on lettuce leaves and over each salad place narrow strips of red and green pepper.
