AMERICAN LEGION

The chamber of commerce of Pittsburgh, Pa., home of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, has voted for the American Legion's adjusted compensation bill. Almost at the same time the chamber at Los Angeles, Calif., with 9000 members and called the largest in the United States, endorsed the bonus. Calling the United States chamber's tactic unfair, the local commerce board at El Dorado, Kan., denied its membership and then voted for the compensation measure.

The American Legion has asked all other veterans who do not have imperative need of cash to follow Rickenbacker's lead.

A string of world war medals (bought at a sale) across his chest, the world's fastest-working beggar took \$60 an hour from New York's theater crowds until the American Legion got the police on his trail.

PORTLAND—Lane Goodell, department commander American Legion of Oregon, has announced that the state organization will circulate petitions within a short time through the posts in the state to obtain enough names to place upon the ballot next November, an anti-Asiatic bill for the exclusion of orientals in Oregon.

KLAMATH FALLS—The American Legion minstrels played for two nights to capacity houses in Klamath Falls. The play under direction of the Klamath Post, American Legion, proved a success and highly entertaining to the people of the community.

ASTORIA, Or.—Clatsop county organization of the Legion posts of Seattle, Astoria and Wauna has been perfected. The council meeting in Astoria recently decided to hold meetings quarterly.

TOLEDO, Or.—Alden Abbey Post No. 54 of Toledo will transport its two story house to the new legion site in Toledo. Another story will be added to the building after it is moved to its new location.
