### DECEIT TERMED CHIEF CAUSE OF DIVORCE EVIL

wife is guilty of deception. She buys clothes beyond her husband's means, charges them and deceives her husband about their cost. When she makes the purchases she expects to pay for them, but how she is going to get the money is another question. She trusts to luck and usually her husband gets the bills and there is a scene, tears and bitter words—then divorce.

"Intemperance, of course, is a major factor in divorce cases, but investigation shows that intemperance is the result, not the cause, of married unhappiness," said Judge Graham.

And here the judge, who has sent many couples reunited from his courtroom, pointed out the remedy that might curb the evil.

#### "Couples Who Kiss"

"Husband and wife who trust each other, who harbor no secrets from each other, who kiss at parting and kiss at the evening reunion never get into the divorce courts.

"The woman who loses at bridge and tries to hide her losses from her husband is making the gravest mistake.

"The husband who 'keeps his business affairs' to himself and deceives his wife when things go wrong, is courting marital disaster.

"All women like to be trusted, and few of them betray genuine, full-hearted confidence.

"Deceit is the microbe of divorce. It is the start of all troubles that lead to the divorce courts.

"My advice to young couples just starting out on the uncertain voyage of matrimony is to be square with each other at all times. Then the ship will weather every storm," he said.

### LOST CABIN MINE

"In the spring of 185—, while the southern border of Oregon was ringing with the battles of that memorable war between the heroic settlers of the territory and the Shasta and Rogue River Indians, two brothers by the name of Wilson—James and Henry—arrived at Jacksonville, and, getting together a small party of hardy and experienced miners, set out, fully armed, to prospect for gold along the rivers and among the broken ranges of mountains southward of that then prosperous mining town. The party had been out for several weeks, meeting with but little success, and had just lost one of their number in a skirmish with the Indians, when a council was called, and all but the Wilson brothers concurred in the opinion that it was best to return to Jacksonville and wait for the conclusion of the war.

The Wilsons were of a haughty, obstinate spirit, thorough in mountain craft and brave to recklessness. With them daring was a habit and danger a luxury, and they held out against the arguments and entreaties of their more prudent comrades, until it was agreed finally, that they should have the greater part of the provisions, ammunition, etc., and continue in their search, while the others would retrace their steps by the shortest and safest route.

"On the morning of parting, James Wilson rose up in his stirrups, and swinging his rifle aloft with an arm splendidly muscular, exclaimed: 'Good-bye, boys! and good luck to you, but we can't go back. There is gold somewhere behind that smoky line of mountains and we are going to dig it out, though all the redskins of the wilderness stand guard over it! We'll come back rich as kings, boys! or leave our bones to bleach there; it's a glorious battleground!'

"This high speech fired the heart of the retreating party for a moment, and some of them turned, as though they too, would fain peril their lives for that without which life is more bitter than death; but the momentary flash of heroism went down, and, shaking their heads in denial, they rode away, shouting back rude words of cheer.

"They never met again. The main division reached Jacksonville after many days of wearisome and perilous travel, and waited in vain through lengthening months for some tidings of the Wilsons. Their story is sealed to all, save me. I owe my own knowledge of their further progress and final fate to the fact that we were cousins and confidential friends.

NEW YORK, March 17.—The Countess Minotto, wife of Count Minotto, and daughter of Louis F. Swift, millionaire meat packer, is by all odds the most beautiful woman in the world, according to Margot Asquith, who started the world with a book on the "secrets" of British society. Mrs. Asquith has just completed a tour of America.

Puffing a cigarette, held between her restless fingers, she gave her ideas of just what constitutes beauty.

"Sensitive loveliness, face, form and grace!" "When beauty is the gift of the Creator it is as fair as art. Always beautiful women have elegance. Countess Minotto has beautiful features, face, skin—and she has sweep—the French have words for it."

Wistfully Mrs. Asquith said a startling thing, as if she knew she was breaking a fond delusion of numberless women:

"Beauty is a thing in itself," she declared. "The Almighty is a mighty handicapper, and when He gives visual beauty He does not always give marvelous intellect or soul. The two things are separate. One does not make the other."

"I Carry No Illusions"

"Loveliness—perhaps a plain woman can be lovely. Many ugly women are lovely. But beauty is beauty. I carry no illusions."

"It does not necessarily need patrician blood to breed it. It can spring out anywhere. I have seen many fair women in America, women with the lovely expression of human interest and sympathy that I love."

"But if you ask me for really beautiful women I'll have to tell you that I have seen very few in my lifetime. Queen Alexandria of England is a beautiful woman; she is old now, but she was beautiful. Lady d'Abernon, wife of the British ambassador to Berlin, is a beautiful woman. Mrs. Lanstry, of London. Yes, I've also met one in Canada—Mrs. Lawford, of Montreal."

Mrs. Asquith let it be understood that praise from her is high praise, indeed. With a slight lift of one shoulder—a frequent mannerism—she reiterated her belief that beauty is very rare. "You know even in England, which is famous for beautiful women, we don't produce them every day."

"We live more in the open in England, and the flowers and trees and hay do something to our women. Princess Mary is charming. She is rosy and pretty and engaging—of the sweet and fresh type of English loveliness.
