The chamber of commerce will hold its regular meeting tonight in the city hall, and it is hoped that there will be a large attendance, as this is the first meeting since the recent election, following which there has been a reorganization of the officers of the board of directors. On this occasion Mr. McNair will make his appearance for the first time as president, and no doubt the directors will have prepared something in the nature of a program, or outline of what the chamber hopes to accomplish for Ashland during the year.

In times past the board and the secretary have been severely criticized by the public for their lack of activity, but when all is said and done, the public—at least that portion of it which has a membership in the chamber of commerce—are largely responsible for inaction. The position of director is a thankless one at best, the only possible reward for any effort they may put forth being in the sense of satisfaction they may derive of having done their best in

forwarding the interests of the city. The membership, as a rule, take little interest in the affairs of the chamber, unless some vital stake is at issue or there is a factional row in which they are compelled to line up on one side or the other. If the membership would attend the meetings and aid the board of directors to the extent of giving them the benefit of such ideas as they may have along constructive lines, it would quicken interest in every undertaking, and it would be distinctly evidenced in the accomplishment of the purposes for which chambers of commerce are organized and maintained.

When those whose interests are most vitally affected are lackadaisical as to how these interests are cared for, it is only a natural result that those entrusted with the care of those interests should lose their enthusiasm. Place the blame where it belongs; the membership is directly responsible for the short-comings which they are prone to lay at the door of the board of directors. If they would keep up their standing in the chamber, and attend the meetings with the same degree of regularity as they do the lodges with which they are affiliated, there would be less cause for complaint and the chamber of commerce could go forward in great and constructive work for the advancement of Ashland. It's worth trying out anyway, and there will never be a better time than the present to show your interest; to demonstrate that your heart is in the right place, where the interests of Ashland are concerned. Attend the meeting tonight. Do not let a little thing like the weather keep you away. You've had the 57 varieties during the winter just ending, and surely ought to be pretty near weather proof.

The board of directors will be able to quicken interest by the constructive program for the year's work, which undoubtedly will include some definite plan for securing the erection of the big hotel and sanitarium, the project which today appears to be closest to the hearts of the people of Ashland.
