They are manipulated by introducing a trilling effect with the hands. Mr. Davis' skill is unsurpassed, and his instrument is by far the most elaborately constructed of the kind on the concert stage today. Tickets are 50 cents for adults, 25 cents for children. The ambassador replied with a short talk in which he expressed surprise at what had been accomplished in the short time since the west had first begun to develop. He said he found the people of the west were broad-minded and liberal and that he could easily believe what he had frequently heard that, once a citizen of the west, one would never again be satisfied with the east. He also expressed the hope that the entire English-speaking people of the earth would come to a common understanding, as all have the same ideas and ideals, and all want to see peace all over the world. He closed his remarks by thanking the Chamber of Commerce and people of Ashland for the reception given to him self and Lady Geddes.

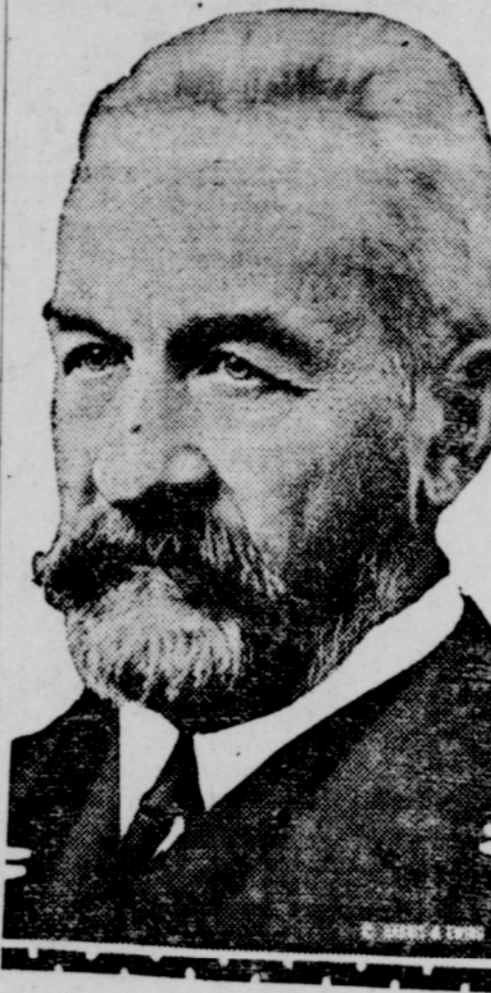

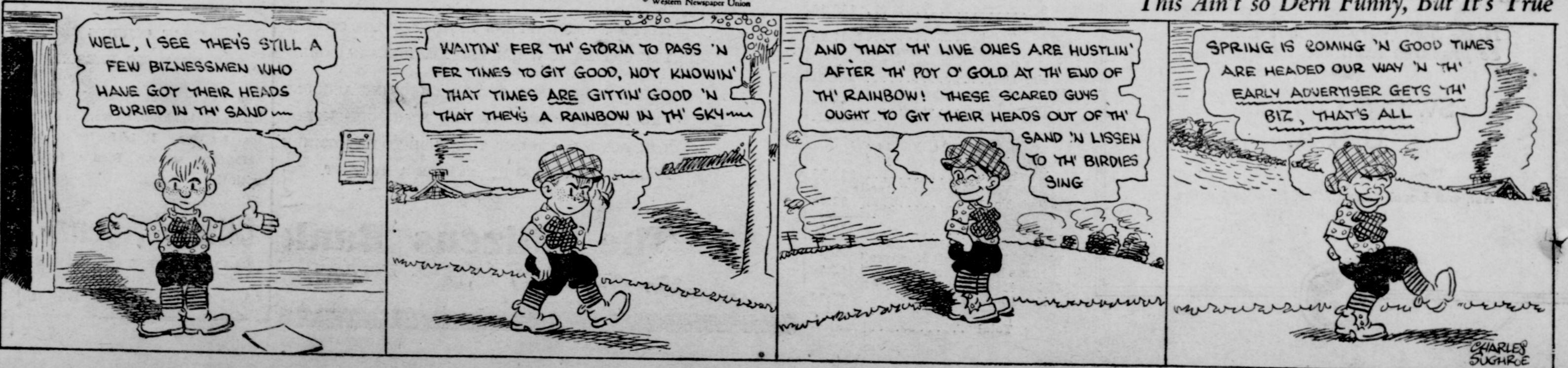
