ONIONS IN PRICE ARE RANKING WITH DELICACIES

CHICAGO, March 31.—The lowly onion rose from a common vegetable nearly to the rank of a delicacy and easterners were reported enjoying Egyptian importations as a result of diminishing supplies and a big jump in prices. This is according to the United States bureau of markets' weekly fruit and vegetable review, made public yesterday.

Onion prices were the highest since 1917, having increased \$2.50 and \$3.50 per 100 pounds in leading eastern cities.
