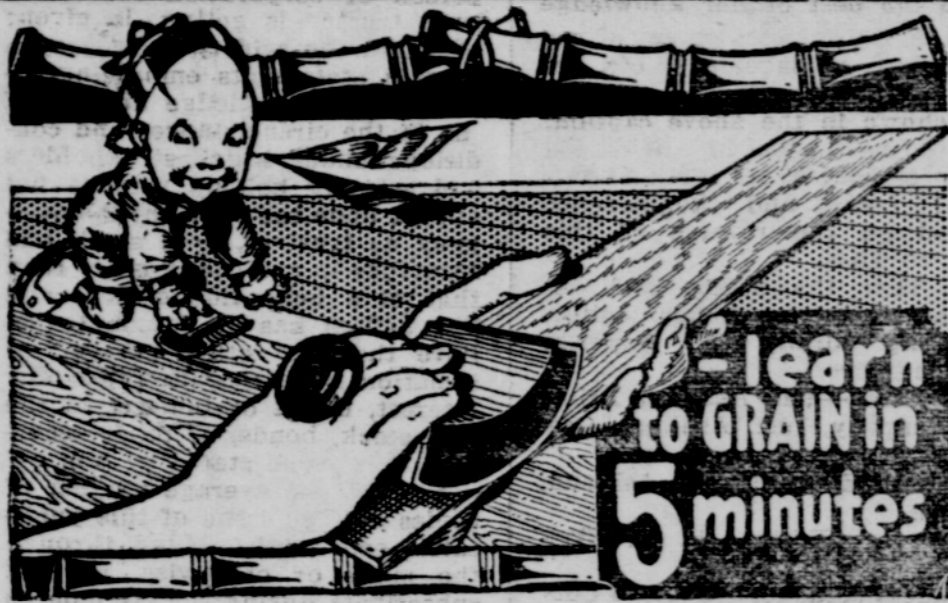

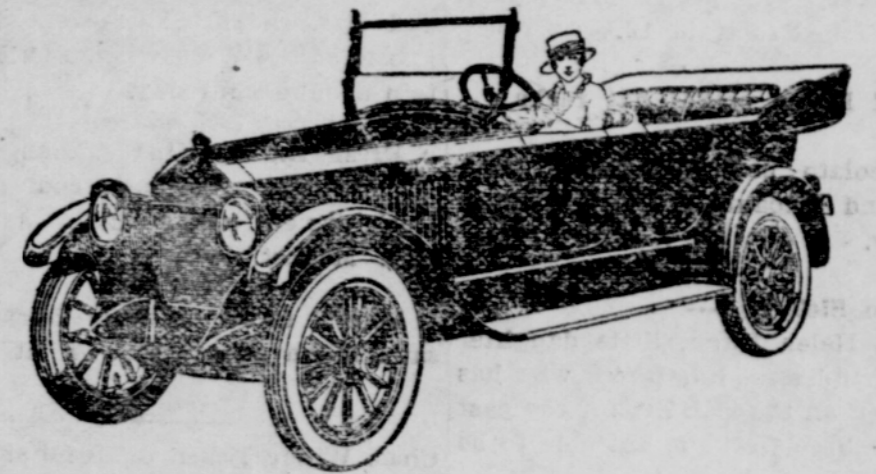

Clean Up and Make Ashland Attractive

Ashland has a good deal of cleaning up to do, and the sooner it is done the better for the community and the individual. No one will question the statement that this is one of God's garden spots and one of the most delightful places on earth in which to live. The people should show their appreciation of these facts by keeping ever in mind the precept that "cleanliness is next to Godliness." The most beautiful spot in the world can be made unlovely by uncleanness born of neglect.

Get after the back yards and alleys and clear away the litter of junk that accumulates so quickly and is the bane of the housewife and an offense to the sense of sight, and sometimes smell. The city authorities will help you get rid of the accumulation, as promised in the proclamation of Mayor Lamkin, published above.

Don't wait for "Clean-Up Day." Do it now! It is commanded that "six days shalt thou labor, and rest on the seventh. But if tomorrow you should start in on a cleaning-up campaign—working instead of resting on the Sabbath—so that your operations make for cleanliness that will bring restfulness to the eyes of the community, you will be living up to the spirit of the commandment rather than violating it, "for that which ye do, will be good."

It costs a community more to be dirty than to keep clean. Consider the toll of disease, fire and depreciation, through filth, disorder and neglect. For one example: Dust and

grime are said to be responsible for more than 50 per cent of the wear and tear on clothing and house furnishings.

It is not surprising, then, that the people of America have been thoroughly aroused to the necessity for community cleanliness. When the National Clean-Up and Paint-Up bureau in St. Louis first sounded its call to arms on May 1, 1912, there was an almost instant and nationwide response.

Today more than 7000 cities and towns with a probable average of 1000 volunteer workers, or a total of 7,000,000 men, women and children, are working together for a common cause—"to make this community as clean as its cleanest home."

This is but the power of an idea multiplied by the multitude. It is the mass idea extended and lengthened. It is co-operation in its highest development, and its visible results represent the most practical and therefore the finest kind of altruism.

It was not difficult to convince these 7,000,000 co-operators that their united efforts would enable all of them to enjoy greater comforts and economies.

Every housewife realizes that dirty streets and yards in her community are a real burden on her time and purse. The dust from the streets finds lodgement in her curtains, draperies and carpets. It makes her housekeeping an endless burden.

And so with the merchants and all

other classes. No home owner would attempt to clean up the entire community, but when a large number work together in an concerted effort to clean up, the result is apparent to all of them.

A FACTOR IN CIVILIZATION'S PROGRESS

Some sections of the United States have been rather slow to learn the relation of paint to patriotism and pride; but, taking the country as a whole, it sees this close connection with more certainty than it did a decade ago. The increased production of materials used in the making of paint is so much greater than usual that it is being credited chiefly to the rapidly developing campaign for community improvement which has for its slogan, "Clean Up and Paint Up." So surely and practically does organized effort for civic good register itself in statistics of trade that cannot be impeached by the most skeptical of Philistines.—Christian Science Monitor.
