EXPECT ACTIVITY IN SCOTT VALLEY TIMBER

YREKA, Calif., April 3.—With the coming this week of an emistry of capital in search of property, preferably timber land, it would seem that the long unexploited territory in Scott valley is to come into the lime light.

Word received at a local business institution from a source that is reliable beyond a chance of mistake, indicates that undoubtedly the timber lands in and tributary to Scott valley will be worked in the immediate future, with undoubtedly the erection of one or more god sized mills in the territory.

With this an established fact, it would suggest a railroad for that long neglected section, and as reports from financial sources seem to indicate that the rates on time loans are dropping, it might have some effect on the local situation. The Yreka railroad came very near being put into Scott valley just before the earthquake for the purpose mentioned above. It would seem, therefore, that it is not too late yet.

PROSPECTING FOR OIL NEAR HORN BROOK

HORN BROOK, Calif., April 3.—F. T. Frandenburgh, who for the past year has been a resident of Santa Monica, came up from his southern home last week and will in the immediate future begin a series of experiments on his ranch of 160 acres about a mile and a half out of Hornbrook.

Mr. Frandenburgh has strong reasons to believe that on his land a deposit of valuable shale rock is located, and his experiments will have to do with the extent and value of such a deposit. An experimental machine will be put in use whereby the rock may be tested for oil content, as well as gas during the process of extraction.

Government men have been looking around the county for oil indications and it is no startling disclosure that valuable shale rock is to be had in the section mentioned. Just how valuable, and to what size the deposits are found has to be determined definitely.

- Oysters and Bacon
Drain and dry oysters. Roll each oyster in a slice of bacon and fasten with a toothpick. Cook in a hot frying pan until bacon is crisp. Serve on toast.
Creamed Oysters or Clams
Follow directions for creamed fish. Creamed oysters can be used to fill patty shells.
Scalloped Oysters
Follow directions for scalloped fish.
Panned Oysters or Clams
Heat two tablespoons of butter or substitute in a heavy frying pan. Add two cups of drained oysters. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Shake the pan constantly until the edges of the oysters are curled. Serve on buttered toast.
Steamed Clams
Clams should be bought alive in the shell. Wash well in several waters to remove all sand. Put into a large kettle. Allow one-half cup of boiling water for two quarts of clams. Cover kettle closely and steam until the shells are partially open. If liked a clove of garlic or an onion may be added for flavor. Serve with melted butter.
Lobster or Crab Newberg
Two cups diced lobster or crab, two tablespoons of butter or substitute, one cup of thin cream or rich milk, one egg or two egg yolks, one teaspoon lemon juice, half teaspoon salt, nutmeg, paprika.
Melt the butter, add lobster and cook two minutes. Add cream, beaten egg and cook over hot water until thickened, stirring constantly. Add seasonings and serve.
Devised Crab or Lobster
Two cups diced lobster or crab, one and a half cups milk, three tablespoons butter or substitute, three tablespoons flour, half teaspoon mustard, half teaspoon salt, two teaspoons lemon juice, one teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, one teaspoon finely chopped parsley.
Melt butter, add flour; mix until well blended, cook until frothy; add milk, stir constantly until thickened. Mix seasonings and add with diced lobster. Put into ramekins or shells, cover with buttered crumbs and bake about 15 minutes, or until a golden brown.
Creamed Codfish
The fish should be picked into small pieces; this is easier to do before the fish has been soaked. Drain and cover with lukewarm water, and simmer ten minutes. Prepare a white sauce as for creamed fish and garnish with slices of hard-boiled eggs.
Fish Balls
One cup shredded cooked fish, one and a half cups mashed potatoes, one egg beaten slightly, salt if necessary.
Mix, shape into balls, roll in flour. Heat two tablespoons of drippings or fat and fry the fish balls until a golden brown on each side.
In broiling a fish, wash, wipe dry and brush it over with melted butter or oil. Place on a double wire

point until tender. The time required is usually from six to ten minutes for each pound of fish.
To make a fish pie fill a baking dish with well-seasoned creamed fish and then cover with mashed potatoes and bake until potatoes are a golden brown.
Fish will hold its shape and can be handled easier if wrapped in a piece of cheesecloth before placing in the hot water. A rack or plate should be placed on the bottom of the kettle to prevent the fish from sticking and possibly burning.
Always serve a salad (green preferred) with a French dressing or slices of lemon with all fish dishes. If sauces are used they should be seasoned with lemon juice.
