

# How to Make a Radio Set

By WILLIAM G. H. FINCH Associate Member Institute Radio Engineers

(Written for International News Service.)

NEW YORK, March 31.-Now we come to one of the most important items that enter into the success of any radio station-the aerial, or antenna (means for absorbing or radiating electric magnetic waves, as used in a radio telephone.)

As mentioned in one of the previous articles, an aerial, or antenna, is a conductor supported in the air objects. There are many types of aerials, such as the flat top "T" type, Miss Juda Trunnel, of Cottage Fig. 1; inverted "L" type, Fig. 2; over for a few days visit en route. or even more).
