Institute Presented by Sir Rider Haggard With Ring Taken From Peruvian Mummy.

The friend's story was that while traveling in Peru he had opened a gravemound in which he found a stone table with 13 mummifled figures seated round it. On the finger of the principal figure was this ring, which the discoverer withdrew; and the bodies, according to his story, crumbled into dust.

It was the legend attached to this ring which, according to Sir Rider LOST-Saturday night at Kingsbury Haggard, first turned his imagination toward the invention of stories of adventure; and readers of "King Solomon's Mines" will recognize in it the origin of a striking episode in that book.
