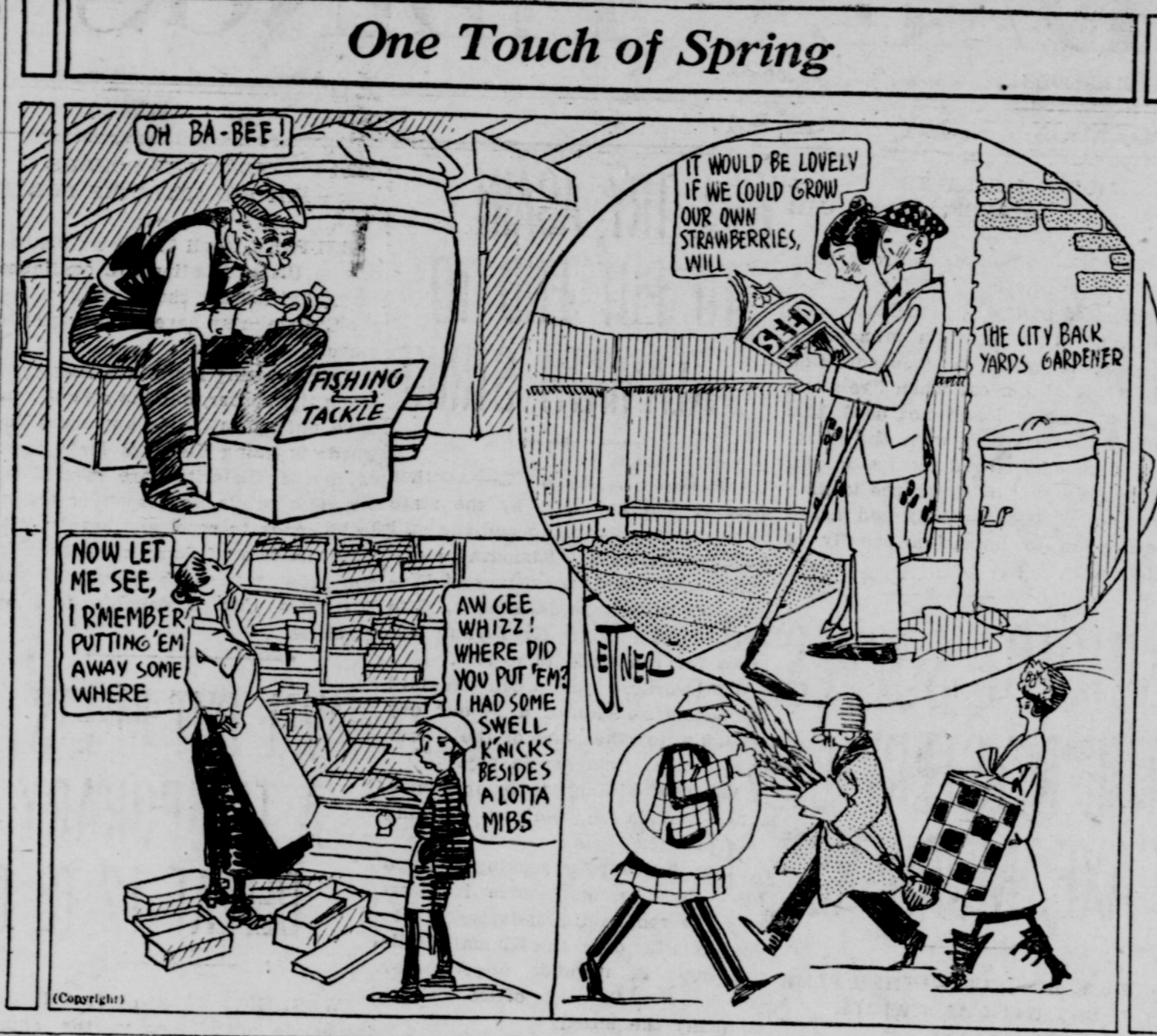

KEY NOTE MINE IS IMPROVING WITH AGE

Work is progressing on the new discovery in the Fools' Paradise district, known as the Key Note mine, and it would seem that the discoverers had really uncovered something worth while in that supposedly barren country, says the Siskiyou News.

At the present the ledge has been uncovered for fully 300 feet on the surface, gold bearing ore holding about the same for the entire distance, picture rock being obtainable in some instances that runs away up in value.

In the tunnel at 35 feet the drift south is in four or five feet of good free-milling ore, while to the north the pay chute is averaging over two feet in width with rock that contains, in many instances, free gold visible to the naked eye.

Visiting mining men do not hesitate to say that the property is a valuable one, which will pay big returns.
