MULTIPLICITY WILL WEAKEN

There has been some talk of putting an Ashland candidate in the race for state senator against Ben Sheldon. Under existing conditions, such a move would be a big mistake. Ashland already has a candidate in the person of Thomas H. Simpson for county commissioner. It is of more than passing interest to Ashland that she be ably represented in the county court. It would be hard to find an Ashland man who would be more valuable to this section in the state senate than Ben Sheldon. He has stood by Ashland interests in season and out, both as a member of the legislature and as a citizen.

Ashland can nominate and elect Mr. Simpson as county commissioner, if it centers its force on it, but by putting in a multiplicity of candidates for other offices, they will divide their forces as well as lose down valley support that would be given Mr. Simpson if he was the only Ashland candidate in the field.

It is to be hoped that no ill-advised action will be taken that will result in Ashland losing all her candidates in the primary election.

PRESIDENT ISSUES PROCLAMATION COUPLING IT WITH FOREST PROTECTION WEEK

Whereas, the protection and perpetuation of our forests are vital to our continued industrial welfare and national strength and to our individual health, comfort and prosperity, and

Whereas, a period of fifty years has passed since in April, 1872 there was instituted in the state of Nebraska observance of a day especially set apart and consecrated for tree planting and known as Arbor day, and

Whereas, both through widespread annual celebration of Arbor day and through the increasing observance of Forest Protection week, public attention has been commendably directed to the value of trees, the unnecessary waste of our diminishing forests through preventable fires, the deplorable effects of forest devastation and the need for remedial measures against depletion of an essential natural resource.

Therefore, I, Warren G. Harding, president of the United States, do urge upon the governors of the various states to designate and set apart the week of April 16-22, 1922, as Forest Protection week, and the last day of that week, April 22, as the golden anniversary of Arbor day, and to request officers of public instruction of counties, cities and towns and of civic and commercial organiza-

tions to unite in thought and action for the preservation of our common heritage by planning such educational and instructive exercises as shall bring before the people the disastrous effects of the present waste by forest fires and the need of individual and collective effort to conserve the forests and increase our tree growth for ornament and use.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

Done, in the District of Columbia, this 31st day of March, in the year of our Lord 1922, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the 146th.

WOMAN INCITES CRIME; YOUTH PAYS PENALTY

KITANNING, Pa., April 8.—It was the man who paid here the other day. After a jury had found Mrs. Amella Whann, wife of a wealthy Chicasaw physician, guilty of inciting Eugene Sanz, her Cuban lover, to murder the doctor, his benefactor, so they could "begin life anew," she was released on \$2500 bail.

The youth was brought into court and sentenced to 10 years and six months in the penitentiary.

Despite her husband's faith, which survived the most damning statements of Sanz on the witness stand, a jury found Mrs. Whann guilty of inciting the youth to murder him and fire their home.
