Shrunken Body is Two Feet Tall. Preserved better than many an Egyptian mummy, a shrunken body of an Indian chief who died more than 400 years ago has been brought to the United States by Jaun Kratiel, a Peruvian engineer. The mummy is only 25 inches high, for the body was shrunk and preserved by a secret "pickling" process known only to the South American Indians. Tradition records that this is the

mummy of Karruba, a Peruvian chief who led his tribe against the Spaniards in 1535. The beads worn by Senor Kratiel were found with the shrunken warrior.-Popular Science Monthly.
