Mellon is one of those men who cannot conceive of anybody letting go of \$29,000,000 once he had it in his possession; that amount of money would hire the best lawyers in the country and keep

The case of Mrs. C. L. Norvall, the chiropractic physician, who was recently fined \$300 in Red Bluff for practicing without a license, is being watched with considerable interest here where Dr. Norvall is very well known, being the aunt of Mrs. Geo. J. Kinz, whom she has visited several times. It will be recalled that she refused to pay the fine and declared she would work it out in jail rather than submit to what she termed the prostitution of her principles. The states attorney, however, had different views and in seeking a means to compel payment of the fine, instructed the sheriff to bar her out of the county jail.

Dr. Norvall practiced here as a licensed physician under the laws of Oregon, and maintains that she has the right to practice in California. She is upheld by the National Association of Chiropractors, although in California the state board of medical examiners have refused to grant a license to chiropractors. Under the general laws of that state, any person practicing without such a license is deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$600 or by imprisonment of from 60 to 180 days, or both.  
 A rather peculiar provision of this law provides that 75 per cent of such fines shall be paid to the board of medical examiners, and the other 25 per cent to go to the county. Out of the fund thus created the board is authorized to employ "legal counsel, inspectors and special agents; they may fix the compensation to be paid for such service, and may incur such other expenses as it may deem necessary."

Under the circumstances it is not at all surprising that the board should be particularly active in collecting fines, and should discourage jail sentences.

At the last session of the California legislature, the chiropractors put up a strong fight for recognition as regular practitioners, but were defeated by a very small vote. They will try again at the next session to have a law passed that will place them on the same plane as other physicians, similar to that in Oregon and pretty much all other states.

Whether the tactics being used by Dr. Norvall will be productive of any practical results remains to be seen, but in any event she has many warm sympathizers in Oregon.

**TOLERANCE**  
 Rev. Harry F. Hubble, Presbyterian pastor, of Buffalo, N. Y., says "all churches should install dance halls." He argues that where there is a "dance hall evil," the way to correct it is not to get rid of it, but to grab it and put the church into it. If here were a few more ministers with so broad a viewpoint, there would be less churches which fail to hold the young man and young woman who today seek diversion where they can get it—in the church, with the church's wholesome influence, if they can, but diversion anyway, church or no church!  
 It's a long, long road from intolerance to sanity of thought. We jailed people for kissing their wives on Sunday but a few score of years ago. When all churches lead the world in tolerance, all the churches will lead the world in influence.—Exchange.
