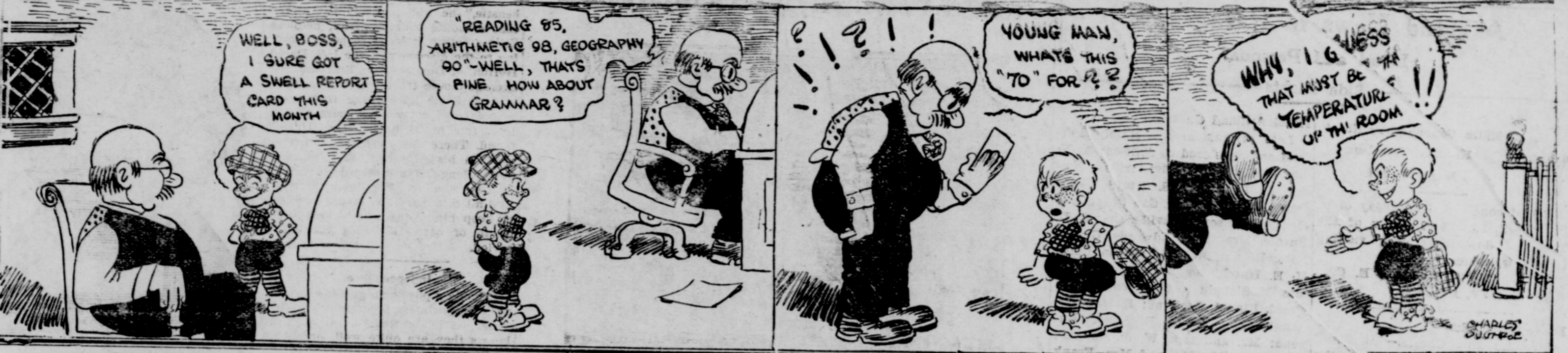

Where Was De Soto Buried?

The question as to what spot on the Mississippi river marks the grave of Hernando De Soto, the discoverer of that stream, is an unsettled one. Arkansas City and Helena, Ark., Rosedale and Greenville, Miss., river towns, have had a four-cornered controversy over the question. Citizens of Helena contend that the Spanish explorer was given a watery grave in the river he discovered at a point just opposite Helena. Arkansas City produces historical data tending to show that De Soto's funeral ceremony was said at a point opposite that city and close to the junction of the Mississippi and White rivers. Rosedale and Greenville have produced evidence in support of their respective claims. So about the only answer one can give in assurance that it will not be disputed is that De Soto's grave is somewhere in the Mississippi between Memphis, Tenn., and Greenville, Miss.
