LODGE WILL HAVE TO BATTLE FOR RE-ELECTION

By GEORGE R. HOLMES, I. N. S. Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, April 21.—There will be some pretty senatorial battles waged during the forthcoming fall campaign, but none of them will hold more national interest than that to be decided in Massachusetts in November.

For thirty years Henry Cabot Lodge has sat in the United States senate watching men come and go. He has seen a lot of them come in like lions and go out quite lamb-like since that chill fourth day of March, back in '93, when he came to the senate for the first time, and Grover Cleveland moved into the White House for his second term.

That Senator Lodge, despite his amused tolerance, is not unaware of the fact that he has a fight on his hands this year as indicated by the fact that he hurried straightway to Massachusetts as soon as the conference treaties were ratified, in order to "take a rest" and look after some "political fencing."

Some democrats are so confident that they are going to "get" Lodge this year that they are already picking out jobs for him after his defeat. The most common report current around capital tea tables is that should Massachusetts retire Senator Lodge this year he will be sent to London as American ambassador to the Court of St. James, replacing Colonel George Harvey. What is going to happen to Colonel Harvey the whippers do not state.

Henry Cabot Lodge has seen more party service than any man in the republican party today, not even excepting Ellihu Root or "Uncle Joe" Cannon. He served four terms in the house before coming to the senate, in 1893, and before that he was two years in the Massachusetts legislature.

More than forty years in legislative service! Truly a veteran is Henry Cabot Lodge.

More than twenty years ago, in 1900, he was permanent chairman of the republican national convention that re-nominated McKinley.

He was chairman of the committee on resolutions and framed the republican platform in 1904, when Roosevelt was nominated. Again in 1908, he was permanent chairman at the Chicago convention, at which Taft was nominated.

Senator Lodge's autobiography is markedly silent about 1912, when Roosevelt bolted in Chicago; but again, in 1916, he was permanent chairman at the great peace convention, and he occupied the same coveted position in 1920, when Harding was selected—a man in swaddling clothes, politically speaking, so far as Henry Cabot Lodge is concerned.

There was an occasion in that hectic 1916 convention when Henry Cabot Lodge almost became the compromise candidate for the presidency. Roosevelt, sitting at Oyster Bay, with the whip-hand, sent word that Lodge was acceptable to him as a compromise man. It failed to go over. But that is another story.

CHAPEAU HINTS FOR SPRING

Fruits and Flowers in Abundance Are Predicted for Use on Variety of Headgear.

The wizards of millinery art are busy planning the creations that will adorn millady's proud head this spring. Some of the advance models are already on display and if there is anything in signs, the spring is due for a rainbow of color in contrast to the sombre of winter.

There is a new shade of violet bound to be becoming to the fair skinned and blond or brunette type equally well. It is a sort of blue when first discovered, yet, one could not safely call it blue without fear of having one's neighbor call it violet. So subtle is the color note, that it is truly charming. Rose, too, has a strange new blend. It mixes with orchid to form a decidedly new shade for spring millinery.

Fruit and flowers in abundance are predicted. According to present signs, the hats will be small, but brimmed. At front, just above the short brim, a multitude of colorful fruits and flowers nestle together. Novelty fruit, such as pink grapes on a violet hat is shown. Silver grapes on gray are new and fascinating. So also are the green and yellow and blue fruits that nestle together to form a bizarre effect at the front of a tangerine hat in chiffon tulle.

Boudoir Garments Are Wool Trimmed. Among the very popular and practical boudoir robes of the present season is the garment made of a light silk, such as crepe de chine and china silk, interlined with lambs' wool and daintily quilted. Frequently wool embroidery supplies the trimming touch, although quite as many are entirely untrimmed. Washable flannel kimonos are also popular and dainty, and wool challis is used for serviceable boudoir garments. For spring some very dainty cotton crepe negligees are being shown, and the low waistline so much featured in outer apparel enters the negligee field also, some rather pleasing effects having been developed.

Neck Ribbons Again. The fapper set in Paris has resurrected the neck ribbon, and it is fast gaining in popularity. The girls are wearing a band of ribbon tightly about the neck, just below the chin. It is usually about half an inch wide, and the colors run all the way from bright yellow to black. Some of the wearers have a small gold ornament, such as a miniature heart, hanging from the ribbon by a chain in front. It is just a fad and probably won't last more than a couple of months.

HAS DISCOVERED NEW FORCE

Londoner Gives Interesting Description of Manner in Which He Made Important Find.

A simple carbon rod has been discovered by A. E. Barnes, a leading galvanometrist of London, which if held in the hands five minutes will recharge the human system with nerve energy that lasts 12 hours. He says it is nothing new, but, on the contrary, was known to the ancient Egyptians. He said the secret of it was lost many centuries ago. Mr. Barnes said that years ago while he was standing in the British museum before a painted limestone sculpture of Kharfra, an Egyptian king of the fourth dynasty, who built the second of the great pyramids of Gizeh, he noticed the figure was holding two small rods shaped something like the grip on a bicycle. Thereafter he began a series of long experiments to discover the substance which the king held, but he failed in his search until one day when he was trying to improve the microphone, for which he prepared several carbon pencils which had been hardened by a special process of his own. He said that quite accidentally he touched one of these carbon pencils and was surprised to find that his galvanic deflection swung from positive to negative. This led to further experiments, and he finally found that the ordinary arc carbon, when hardened by his process, gave out a force which could not be distinguished from nerve force. The bars are about six inches long and are capped at the ends with celluloid. Mr. Barnes asserted the carbon rods have been of great aid in treating cases of nervous breakdown, deafness, anemia and many other complaints. He declared he did not know what the new force was.

NO AIR PATROL FOR PACIFIC COAST FORESTS

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 21.—No aerial patrol of the forests on the Pacific slope will be made this coming summer, according to orders received by Captain F. I. Eglin, commander at Mather field, which in previous years has provided the machines and aviators who flew over the forests in search of fires. Lack of funds due to cutting of the army appropriation bill by congress and

the reduction in army personnel were the reasons assigned by Captain Eglin for the orders.
