Jenny Lind, Swedish Singer. Jenny Lind, or Madame Goldschmidt, famous Swedish singer, was born at Stockholm October 6, 1820, and died at Wynd's Point, Malvern, November 2, 1887. She first appeared at the Royal theater in Stockholm as Agatha in "Der Freischutz," March 7, 1838. From 1841 to 1842 she studied in Paris. The next two years she spent in Stockholm. From 1844 to 1847 she studied and sang in Germany, going from there to England, where she remained for two years, thence coming to America. She was married to Otto Goldschmidt, conductor and composer, in Boston, February 5, 1852. The last four years of her life she taught singing at the Royal College of Music.

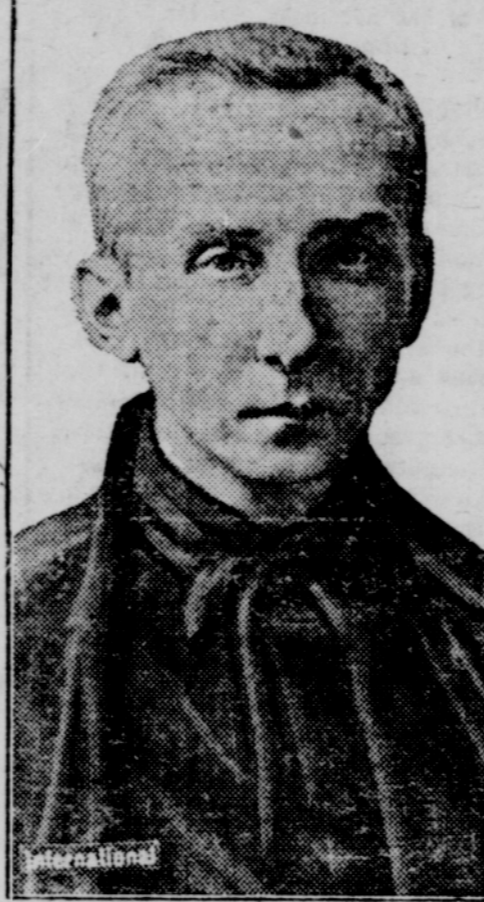

PRETTY SHRUB ALMOST GONE

Mountain Laurel, Once Plentiful Everywhere, Has Been Destroyed Through Public Carelessness.

Many years ago, when the American Indians were the only inhabitants of the United States, the mountainsides in springtime were almost white with the blossoms of claymoun, the Indian name for mountain laurel.

Nowadays the laurel is not so plentiful. People have broken down too many plants and pulled up too many others by the roots. Still you may find some of these low, scraggly bushes if you are familiar with the countryside. For in nearly every hill part of the states, from Maine to Ohio, from Florida to Canada, a few at least of these attractive shrubs are growing.

The roots of these particular plants reach out for surprisingly long distances, seeming to enjoy growing about in the loose soil of the mountainsides. Yet, with all the roving tendencies of the roots, the patches of plants do not spread, but remain about the same size from year to year. Calico-bush is an old-fashioned name for mountain laurel, a name that some country people think is the only name. Spoonwood is another queer name by which you may hear this same plant called.

One of Great City's Tragedies.

An old-time tragedy of the Central Markets, Paris, has been recalled by the death at an advanced age of a once rich woman, who for many years made a poor living there overturning garbage cans and selling anything of value she might be able to find there. Her name was unknown, and for nearly half a century she was merely called "Princess." Fifty years ago it was fashionable for persons of high society in Paris to pass a riotous night in the cafes and stalls of the market. On one occasion a fashionable woman, one of a gay party, was robbed of money and jewels, presumably by her escort. Left penniless, she refused to communicate with her husband or her family in central France. Instead she sought employment and gradually fell into extreme poverty. She got her nickname owing to her invariable habit, when asked about her former life, of replying: "Ask no questions; I am a princess from a far country."

Smiling Porches.

More houses are being built with inclosed porches than ever before; you may walk down long streets of dear little homes whose porches smile at you through tiny panes of glass. You pass medium-sized places with grounds, comfortable houses set back from the road, and large mansions—in every one somewhere you catch the glimpse of an enclosed porch-room. Old-fashioned houses follow suit, and back of the rounded Colonial pillars are fitted small-paned glass partitions that inclose the porch as effaciously as though it had been built that way in the beginning. In the summer these are lifted out, leaving the porch as before.—The Designer.

Canada Pushing Honey Industry.

It is expected that Ontario's honey crop next season will be marketed largely on the co-operative system, as a result of the activities of the committee appointed recently by the Ontario Bee Keepers' association, and with the assistance of the Ontario government. The honey will be graded and have a registered brand for the protection of consumers. Each package will have a distinguishing number, by which it can be traced back to the producer.

Snails in London Restaurants.

English officers who served in France during the war acquired in many cases a taste for frogs' legs and snails, hitherto unknown to London menus. When they returned home they demanded the same tidbits in London and now both frogs' legs and snails are conveyed daily from France to London by airplane. 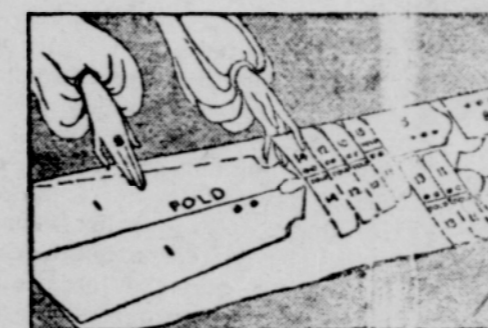
