Norblad for Congress

A service of 15 years in congress has found him at the close of that period without prestige, power or initiative, whereas the call of the times—the pressing demand of ever changing, forward looking conditions—is for men of vision and action. Mr. Hawley affords, in fact, the conspicuous exhibit that congress needs new blood. To elect a man of Mr. Norblad's stamp to succeed him will provide a national service, aside from enhancing the immediate prestige of Oregon as a state, and the Astorian feels confident in its prediction that the people of the district are to take that step.—Morning Astorian.—adv.-1
